

U.S. Census Bureau Estimates for Age, Sex, Race and Hispanic Origin, 2017

Each year, the Census Bureau produces population estimates at varying levels of geography. The release of the age, sex, race and Hispanic origin at the nation, state, and county level completes the 2017 vintage estimate package. Prior pieces of this release include national, state, county, metropolitan/micropolitan, and incorporated place (cities and towns) estimates for the 2017 vintage. All releases include annual estimates from Census 2010 to July 1, 2017.

The five race categories used by the Census Bureau (White, Black or African American, American Indian or Alaska Native, Asian, and Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander) were defined by the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) in 1997. Any determination of race is through self-identification.

The term minority in this document refers to those who identified as Hispanic or any race category other than white. When discussing racial groups, this document is referring to people who identify as non-Hispanic, single-race (i.e. white, Asian, Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander). A person who identifies with multiple race groups would be included in the "Two or More" category.

National Picture

The trend of an aging population seen throughout the decade continued in the 2017 estimates, with the majority of counties across the United States experiencing increases in median age. The national median age increased from 37.2 to 38.0 years from 2016 to 2017. However, 17 percent of counties in the nation (with over half in the Midwest) experienced median age decreases.

These estimates also highlighted increasing diversity across the United States. All race and ethnic groups grew between the 2016 and 2017 estimates, with the exception of non-Hispanic whites. Between 2016 and 2017, Asians were the fastest growing racial group primarily due to net migration and the Hispanic population grew to 18.1 percent primarily due to natural increase.

Utah in the National Context

Utah maintained the lowest median age in the nation. The state also has the lowest share of 65 and older population in the nation, at 10.8 percent.

Despite the continued lowest median age, Utah's overall median age increased from 30.8 in 2016 to 30.9 in 2017. Two Utah counties - Kane and Cache - experienced declines in median age between 2010 and 2017.

Like the nation, Utah's population continued to diversify, with 21.5 percent of the population estimated to be in minority race or Hispanic origin categories.

Age in Utah

As mentioned, the statewide median age was 30.9 years in 2017. Considering age through different population groups (by race and Hispanic origin) provides another level of context for the state.

Statewide, just under 30 percent of the population was 18 years or younger. Over one-third (36.2 percent) of the minority population was under age 18. The non-Hispanic white population is slightly older, with 28.1 percent under the age of 18.

Utah's Asian population has the highest share of those 18 and over and the lowest share of those under age 18. The non-Hispanic white population has the highest share of population over age 65 (12.5 percent). The Asian population is second, with 8.5 percent.

Race and Hispanic Origin in Utah


Utah's minority share increased 3.7 percent from 2016 to 2017. Two or more races, Asian, and Black populations

experienced the fastest growth between 2016 and 2017. Utah's Asian population has experienced the largest percentage increase between 2010 and 2017 at 37.7 percent, followed closely by the Two or More races population at 36.6 percent.

Over forty percent (41.1) of growth statewide between 2016 and 2017 came from minority race groups and people identifying as Hispanic or Latino. Over half of this growth (57.7 percent) was from the Hispanic or Latino population, Utah's largest minority group. The total Hispanic population increased to 434,288 people from 420,667 in 2016.

The Asian population contributed 15 percent of minority growth between 2016 and 2017. Since 2010, the Asian population has experienced the largest percent change, increasing by 37.7 percent. All of this growth equates to a population of 75,471 people in 2017.


Share of Growth by Race and Hispanic Origin, 2016-2017

Age in Utah Counties

Six Utah counties (Piute, Daggett, Garfield, Kane, Wayne, and Grand) all had median ages over 40, although median age in Kane County has decreased from 2010 to 2017 (44.2 in 2010 to 42.4 in 2017).

Utah County had the lowest median age at 24.8. This was the 6th lowest median age in the nation.

Race and Hispanic Origin in Utah Counties

San Juan County continues to be the only county in the state which is minority majority, with 56 percent of the population identifying as something other than non-Hispanic white. Salt Lake County has the largest minority population at 324,783.

Morgan County had the largest percent change in the minority population between 2016 and 2017 at 11.8 percent (61 people).
