Utah's Hispanic Population, 2016

This snapshot provides insights about Utah's Hispanic population using the 1-year estimates from the American Community Survey (ACS). The ACS is a self-response based sample-survey. Data from the ACS are period estimates, representing the collection of information throughout the entire year. To compare, the decennial census provides point estimates.

Although there are many different ethnic groups in the United States, the Census Bureau uses the term "ethnicity" to indicate whether people identify as Hispanic or Latino or not. To estimate the Hispanic or Latino population, respondents self-identify if they are Hispanic or Latino or not. In the ACS, the question asked is "Is this person Spanish/Hispanic/Latino?" with options identifying various countries of origin (Mexico, Puerto Rico, Cuba, etc.).

In 2016, 13.8 percent of Utah's population identified as Hispanic or Latino, making them the largest minority group. Almost three-quarters of the Hispanic population identifies as Mexican. The next largest share of Utah's Hispanic population in 2016 were people from South America, followed by Central America.

Race is considered a person's self-identification with one or more social groups. In 2016, just over half of Utah's Hispanic population identified as White. The next largest group was some other race (38.5 percent), followed by two or more races (4.4 percent).



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The Hispanic or Latino population in Utah has a higher share of children (ages 0 to 17) and a lower share of retirement age (ages 65 and over) than the total population of the state. The share of working age population (ages 18 to 64) is similar.

Utah's Hispanic population made up about 11.6 percent of the 25 years and over population statewide. The Hispanic 25 and over population has a higher share of residents with no high school diploma and high school graduates than their statewide peers. The differences in educational attainment are also seen in lower shares of the Utah Hispanic population attaining post-secondary education than the statewide shares.

In Utah, median family income is higher than median household income. This is also seen in the Hispanic population, with median household income at \$47,167 and family median income at \$49,167 in 2016. The vast majority of the Hispanic population between ages 16 and 64 that is participating in the labor force are employed.

Ten percent of households in Utah are Hispanic or Latino. Across Hispanic households, there is a nearly 50/50 split between home owners and renters. Statewide, 70 percent of households are owner-occupied, while 30 percent are renteroccupied.

Utah's Hispanic households are primarily family households (80 percent) - the majority of which are married couple households. Nonfamily households comprise almost 1 in 5 Hispanic households in Utah. Of these, the majority are single person households. More than 12,000 Hispanic grandparents live with their grandchildren. Just over 22 percent of these grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.
