Utah at a Glance

Utah's Population


- 3.1 million Utah's population has grown by roughly 350,000 people since 2010, with the July 1, 2017 estimate from the Utah Population Committee coming in at 3,114,039.
- Third fastest growing Nationally, Utah was the 3rd fastest growing state, growing 1.9 percent between 2016 and 2017. Growth was a trend in the mountain west, with Idaho coming in first and Nevada second.
- Migration is coming back And edging nearer to prerecession levels. In 2017, 46 percent of population growth can be attributed to migration.
- Fertility is dropping Utah's total fertility rate fell to second in the nation, behind South Dakota.
- But natural increase is still significant Although absolute growth from natural increase has been declining since 2010, it still was responsible for 54 percent of growth between 2016 and 2017.
- Large households Utah has the largest average household size in the nation at 3.19 persons per household.
- Changing age structures While still younger and more fertile than the nation, median age continued its increase in 2017.
- An urban population Three-quarters of the state's population lived along the Wasatch Front (Davis, Salt Lake, Utah, and Weber counties) in 2017.
- Diversifying While the state's population still predominantly identifies as white, non-Hispanic (78.8 percent), the share of residents that identified as Hispanic (13.8 percent), non-Hispanic Asian (2.4 percent) and multiple races (2 percent) increased in 2016 estimates from the Census Bureau.
- Educational attainment Over the past decade, the share of Utahns with a Bachelor's degree has increased from 28.6 percent to 32.6 percent.
- County growth While Salt Lake County is still the most populous in the state, Wasatch and Washington had the highest annual percent growth between 2016 and 2017.
- Cities Salt Lake City is the largest city in Utah, at 193,744 in the latest available estimates. Cities in southern Salt Lake County and northern Utah county saw the highest percentage increase in population between 2010 and 2016.





Utah's Economy


- 2nd strongest job growth The Utah economy added 43,500 new jobs in 2017, an increase of 2.9 percent (only lower than Nevada, at 3.1 percent). This is a result of expansion in every major industrial sector.
- Low unemployment Utah's unemployment rate dropped below 4 percent in 2014. This low rate has decreased even further, to 3.2 percent in November, 2017.
- Largest employers Health care, education, and government entities made up eight of the 10 largest employers in the state. Intermountain Healthcare, the University of Utah, and the State of Utah were the three largest employers in 2016.
- \$16.2 billion The state's budget for fiscal year 2018. Education receives 42 percent (both K-12 and higher education). Social services, the other major expenditure, receives 34 percent.
- Diverse economy In 2017 trade, transportation, and utilities, government (including those working in education), and professional and business services provided the most jobs to Utahns in 2017.
- Tourism A record number of visitors visited Utah's ski resorts and national parks in 2017. The state's leisure and hospitality sector saw 5.1 percent job growth between 2016 and 2017.
- Construction Utah's construction sector posted the highest job growth in 2017 at 5.4 percent, fueled by robust residential and commercial activity.
- Income In 2016, Utah's median household income was \$65,977. Median family income was slightly higher, at \$74,181. Only 16.2 percent of Utah households had retirement income, ranking Utah 45th in the nation.

Figure 3 Utah Annual Job Growth History







Total Utah Jobs





Figure 7 Largest Employers in Utah, 2016

Employment Growth in Utah, 2016-2017




