


U.S. Census Bureau Estimates for Race and Hispanic Origin, Vintage 2021

Each year, the Census Bureau produces population estimates at varying levels of geography. The age, sex, race, and Hispanic origin estimates at the nation, state, and county level is the final release of the 2021 vintage estimate package. Prior releases include national, state, county, metropolitan/micropolitan, and incorporated place (cities and towns) estimates. These releases include annual estimates from July 1, 2020, to July 1, 2021. This expansive, final estimates release contains two fact sheets detailing the results: one for race and Hispanic origin and one for age and sex.

This fact sheet details Race and Hispanic origin at the state and county level. Defined by the Office of Management and Budget in 1997, the Census Bureau uses five race categories: White, Black or African American, American Indian or Alaska Native, Asian, and Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander. Race is a self-identification determination, and people may choose more than one category. The "Two or More" category includes those identifying with multiple race groups. When discussing racial groups, this document refers to people who identify as non-Hispanic, single-race (i.e., White, Asian, Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander), or Two or More Races. The Hispanic category includes individuals of any race that also identified as Hispanic or Latino.¹

In this document, the term minority refers to those identifying as Hispanic or Latino or any race category other than non-Hispanic White.

National Picture

These estimates highlight increasing diversity across the United States. All race and ethnic groups grew between 2020 and 2021, except the White population slightly declined by 0.03%. Between 2020 and 2021, the Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander population was the fastest-growing racial group (1.54%), with the Hispanic population growing the second fastest (1.24%).



Race and Hispanic Origin in Utah

Utah continues to become increasingly racially and ethnically diverse. In 2020, 22.5% of Utahns identified as a race or ethnicity other than non-Hispanic White. In 2021, that share increased slightly to 22.8%. Between 2020 and 2021, Utah's minority population increased 3.1% from 737,112 to 760,087.

Populations identifying as Two or More Races, Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander, and Black or African American (in that order) experienced the fastest growth between 2020

and 2021. The non-Hispanic White population experienced the slowest annual growth.


The Hispanic or Latino population, Utah's second-largest racial or ethnic population, increased 3.0%, from 479,105 in 2020 to 493,636 in 2021. Utah's Asian population is the third largest racial or ethnic group in Utah (84,651 individuals).

Utah's minority population may only account for 22.8% of the total population, but increases in these populations drove 40.8% of statewide growth between 2020 and 2021. The Hispanic or Latino population accounted for over half of minority growth (63%), and the Asian population and Two or More Races group collectively added 24% of minority growth.

Age of Racial or Ethnic Populations in Utah

Utah is a young state due to high fertility and a strong economy that attracts working-age individuals, but these age patterns differ by race and ethnicity. The non-Hispanic White population has the highest percentage of the population over 65, the third-highest percentage of the population over 18 (behind the Asian and American Indian or Alaska Native populations), and the third-lowest percentage of the under 18 population. The low percentage of under 18-year-olds is mainly due to falling fertility rates and births of the non-Hispanic White population and is consistent with national trends.



Over one-third (34.1%) of the minority population is under age 18, and over one in four Utahns under age 18 are minorities. Two-thirds of minority children are Hispanic or Latino. Additionally, almost half of the population identifying as Two or More Races (the fastest-growing racial population in the state) is under 18, and only 3.0% are 65 years and over.

Race and Hispanic Origin in Utah Counties

San Juan County remains the only county in the state where a population other than non-Hispanic White is the largest group. Over half (55.5%) of the population identifies as a minority, driven by the population identifying as American Indians, representing 83% the state's American Indian population (the largest share in the state). Salt Lake County has the largest minority population at 360,327 or 47.4% of the state's minority population. Of the 30.4% of Salt Lake residents identifying as a racial or ethnic minority population, the two largest groups are the Hispanic or Latino population at nearly two-thirds and the Asian population at 14.4%.

Among counties, Morgan County has the largest percentage of non-Hispanic Whites (94.4%), the least racially or ethnically diverse of Utah's counties. Salt Lake County has the largest proportion of the population identifying as Hispanic or Latino, Black or African American, Asian, and Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander. Daggett County has the highest percentage of residents identifying as Two or More Races.

^{1.} A note from the Census Bureau regarding the race and ethnicity estimates in the 2021 vintage: "The race data in these estimates may not be consistent with 2020 Census data. The race categories from each census are reconciled with those race categories that appear in the data from administrative records, which are used to produce population estimates. Due to this, race detail found in the estimates may not match what is found in the decennial census. Additionally, due to methodological changes, the estimates are developed from a base population that combines estimates from Vintage 2020 and 2020 Demographic Analysis with total population from the 2020 Census; no race or Hispanic origin data from the 2020 Census were used in the development of the Vintage 2021 estimates series.
