Salt Lake City 2022 Data Book

Analysis in Brief

Utah's capital city has some unique characteristics compared to other communities in the state. This data book sheds light on various characteristics at the city, city council district, and census tract levels through data from the decennial census and the American Community Survey. While citywide metrics provide one level of detail, examining the characteristics of Salt Lake City's population and households at the neighborhood level reveals much more about its population's diversity, opportunities, and challenges.

- **Decadal Changes**
 - **The adult population drove population growth** – Salt Lake City added 13,312 new residents between 2010 and 2020. This growth came entirely from the adult population.
 - **City Council District 4 added over 6,400 new residents** – the most of any district and about 48% of citywide growth.
 - **Increasing and changing racial and ethnic diversity of residents** – Over two-thirds of the new residents in Salt Lake City identified as racial or ethnic groups outside of non-Hispanic White.
- **Salt Lake City Households are Distinct**
 - Half the city's households are non-family, the largest share in the state
 - Only 15.6% of households are married couples with children
 - Over one-third (37.3%) of households were people living alone. In City Council District 4, these households represented 56.5% of residents.
- **People Move to Salt Lake** – 14.7% of Salt Lake City residents moved from within Utah, and nearly 5% moved from elsewhere in the nation in the last 12 months. Both of these shares are higher than the state.
- **Disparities Between Income and Educational Attainment** – Salt Lake City has a lower median income than the state, but nearly 15% more residents with a Bachelor's degree or higher.

Geography

The Gardner Institute created the census tract codes shown in maps and tables as an abbreviated method of referring to tracts. The letters W, C, and E in tract codes roughly correspond to the city's west, central, and east areas. See the Geography Notes section for additional information about boundaries used in this atlas.

Changes in 2020:

Splits occurred in two Salt Lake City tracts during the 2020 census. The splits occurred in C9 (C9.01 and C9.02 in 2020) and E3 (E3.01 and E3.02 in 2020). The 2020 ACS estimates use this new geography. The updated tract codes are in this document.

The city council boundaries reflect the pre-redistricting boundaries due to the ACS data reflecting information before the redistricting process. The Gardner Institute will use the new boundaries in future iterations of this product.

The 2020 Salt Lake City Data Book presents maps and tables sharing the most recent data about the city's population, housing units, and related characteristics. Salt Lake City Corporation sponsored this research.

This book utilizes two primary data sources:

- Census redistricting summary data file, 2010 and 2020
- Demographic and socioeconomic information from the American Community Survey 2016-2020 5-year Estimates (ACS).

The 2020 census data is independent of the ACS, and data users should not compare the two sources.

Redistricting Data – Total Population, Households, and Age

Population

As of April 1, 2020, the population of Salt Lake City was 199,723, the largest in Salt Lake City census history. The city added 13,312 residents, or a 7.1% increase, from the 2010 census. Salt Lake City residents represent 16.9% of the Salt Lake County population in this data.

The census tracts (statistical geographies representing between 4,000 and 8,000 residents) with the largest absolute growth were those directly east of the I-15 corridor and the Sugarhouse area.¹ All of these areas experienced significant multifamily housing development within the decade. Areas directly west of I-15 and the area between State Street, 700 East, 400 South, and I-80 experienced population loss.

City Council District 4 grew the most, gaining over 6,400 residents. This finding supports analyses conducted by the Gardner Institute throughout the decade, which reflected the same finding.² New large-scale, multi-unit developments built throughout the decade drove the intense population growth in the district.

Housing Units and Occupancy

Salt Lake City gained 11,445 housing units between 2010 and 2020, a 14.2% increase. This growth resulted in 92,169 total housing units in 2020. The vast majority of housing units in Salt Lake City (91.5% or 84,349) were occupied.

Five tracts (C10, C9.01, C9.02, C2, and W7) added the most housing units between 2010 and 2020, with over 1,000 new units in each tract. The increase in tract C2 resulted in a tripling

of housing units, while in C10 it was a 150% increase. Forty-nine tracts in the city have over 90% of housing units occupied, with fifteen tracts over 95%. Only eight tracts had decreases in occupied housing units between 2010 and 2020. Twenty-seven tracts had fewer vacant housing units in 2020 than in 2010.

Nearly 8,000 residents live in group quarters facilities, which include dormitories, full-time care facilities, and correctional facilities. Over one-third (39.3%) of these residents live on the University of Utah campus.

Age

All the population growth in Salt Lake City between 2010 and 2020 came from the adult population. The population under 18 decreased by 4,933 residents, while the adult population increased by 18,245. City Council District 4 added the most new adult residents (6,494), while City Council Districts 1, 3, 6, and 7 added over 2,000 residents. City Council Districts 1 and 2 experienced the largest decreases in the under 18 population, losing 1,652 and 1,565 young residents, respectively. City Council District 4, home to the lowest share of under 18 residents, had the smallest decrease at 57 residents.

Seven tracts (W6, W8, E3.01, W4, E12+, W11, W12) had decreases of 350 or more under 18 residents. The decrease in tract E3.01 was a 50% reduction in the population under 18. Tracts C10 and C2 added the most new residents over 18, with 2,537 and 1,561, respectively. Four additional tracts (W14, W7, E14, and C19) added at least 1,000 new adult residents.

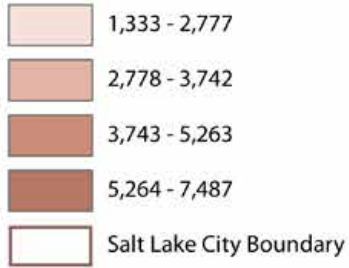

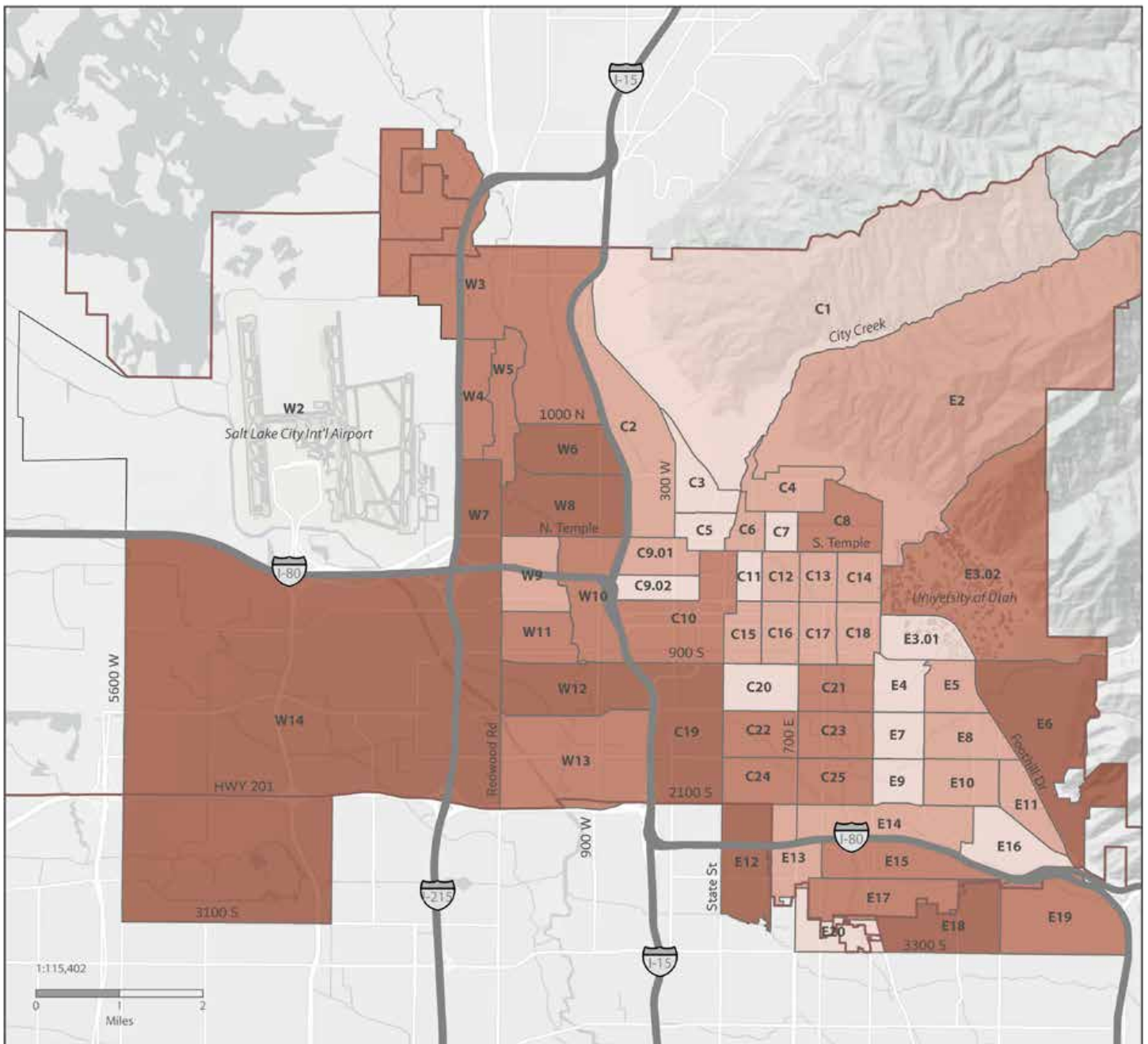
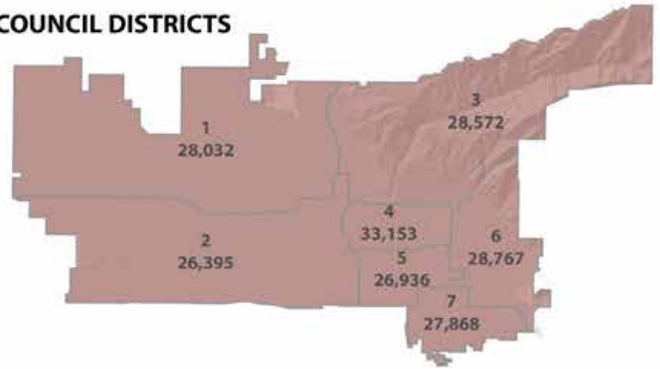
Figure 1: Total Population

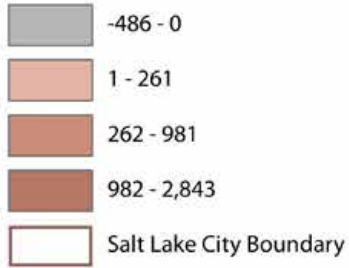

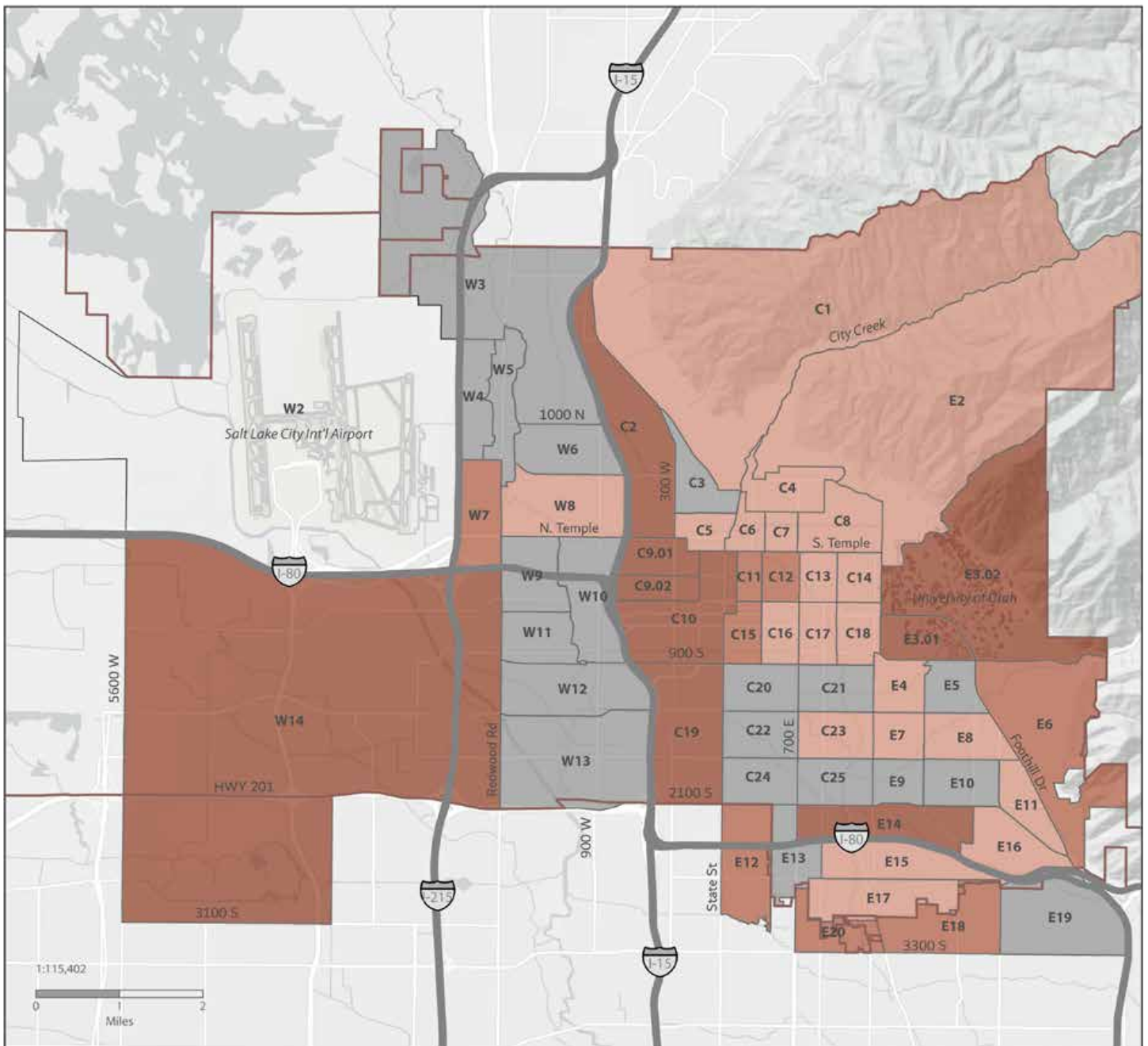
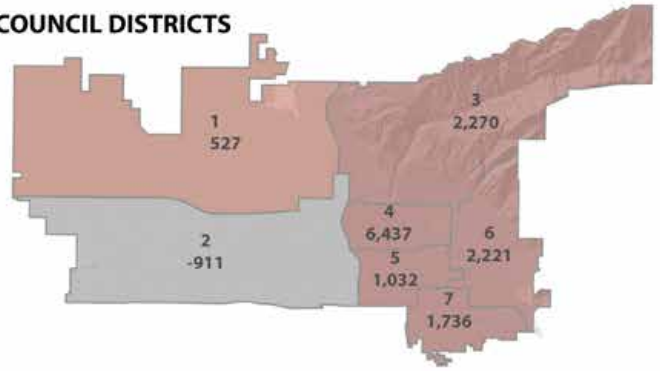
Figure 2: Population Change

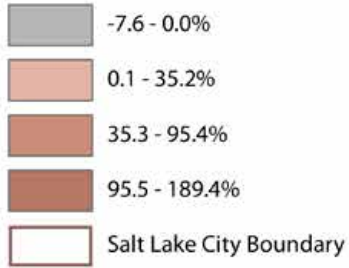

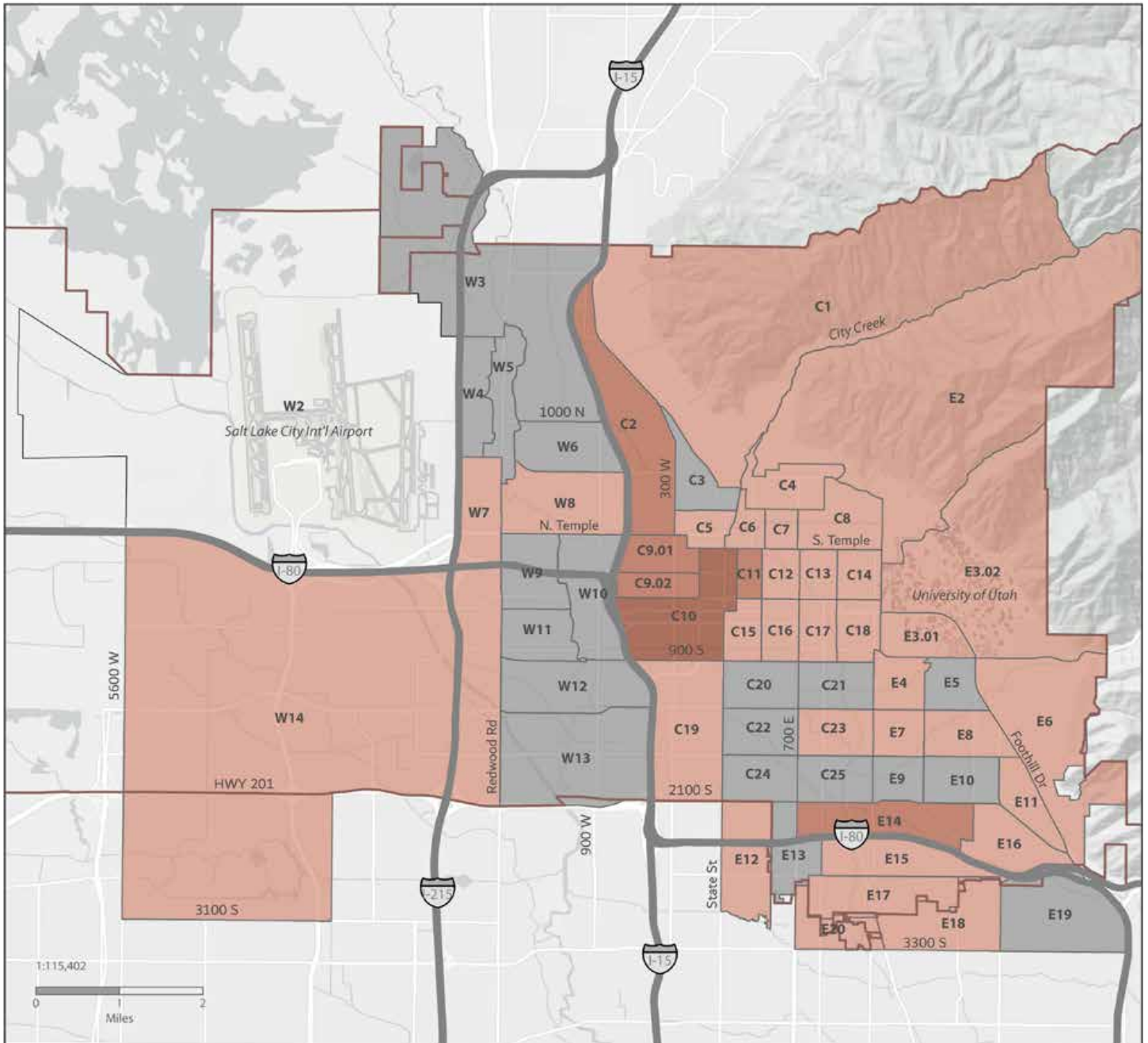
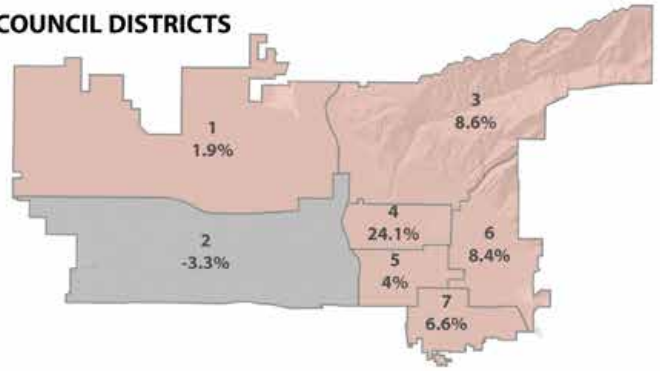
Figure 3: Rate of Population Change

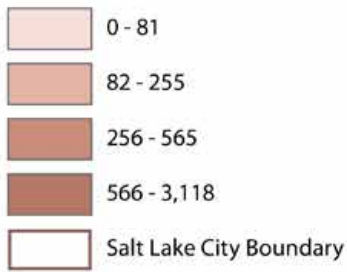

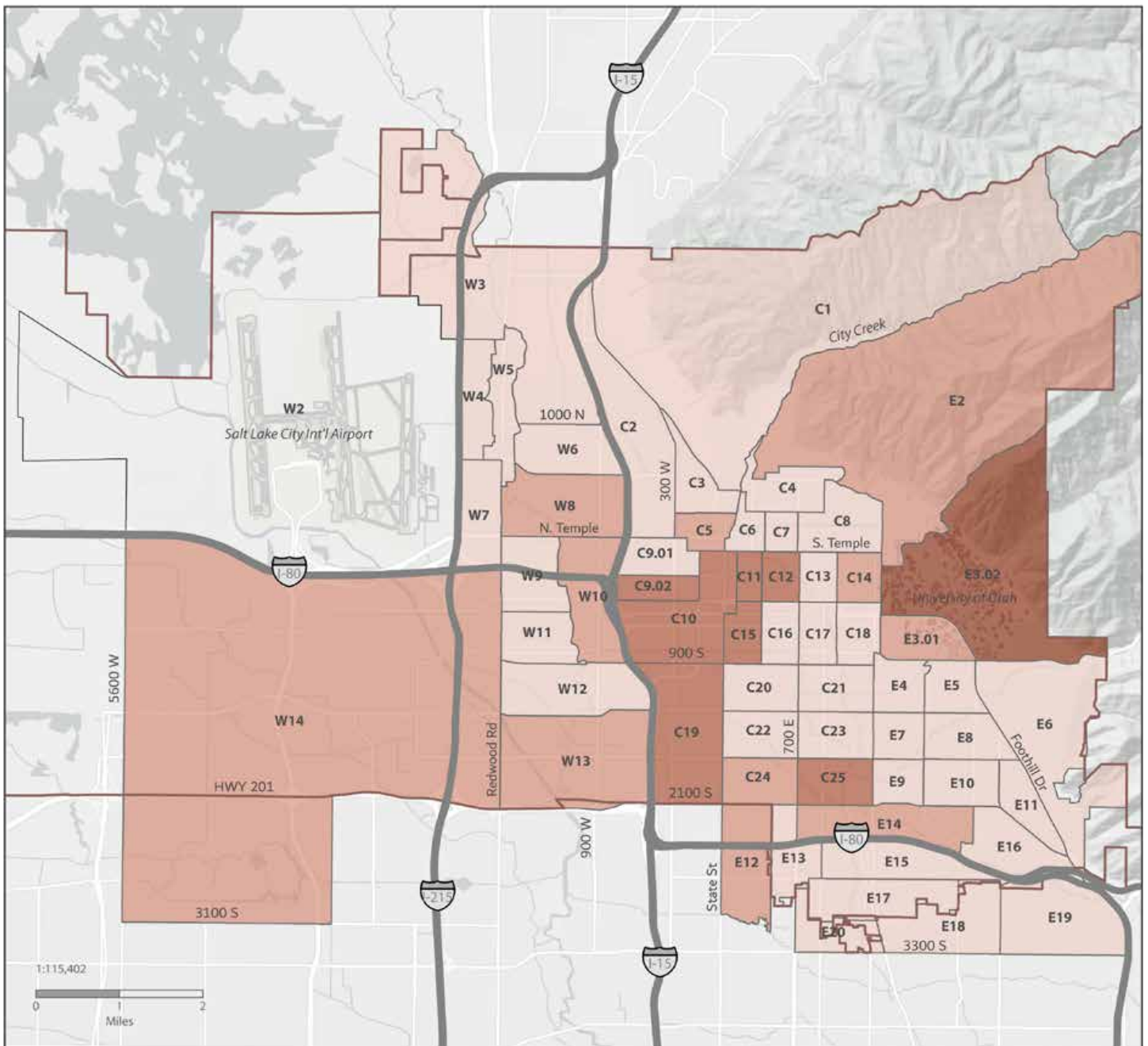
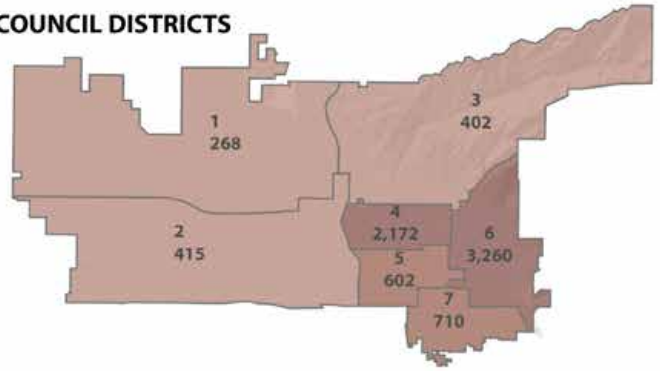
Figure 4: Group Quarters Population

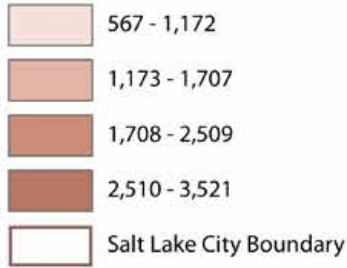

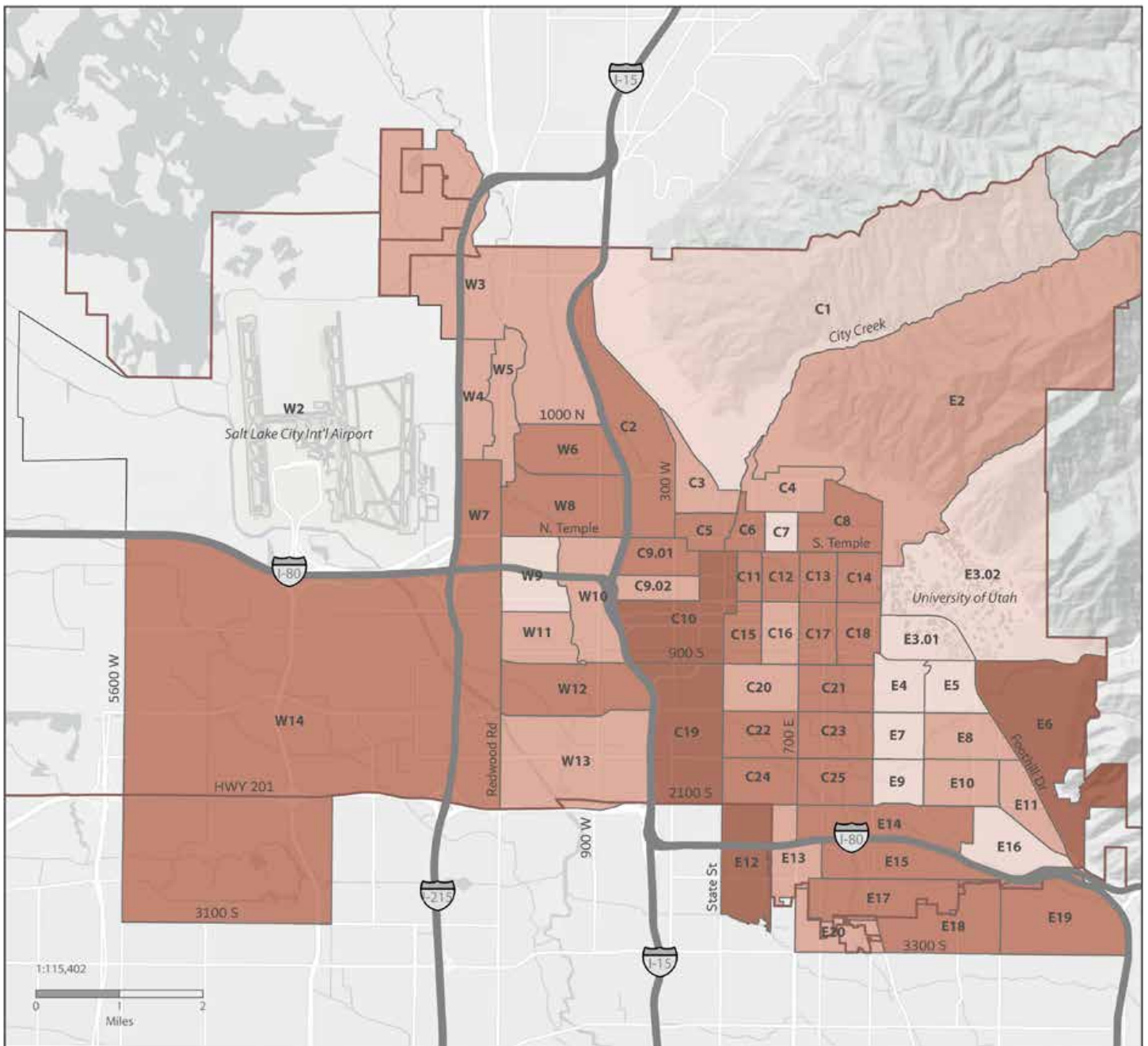
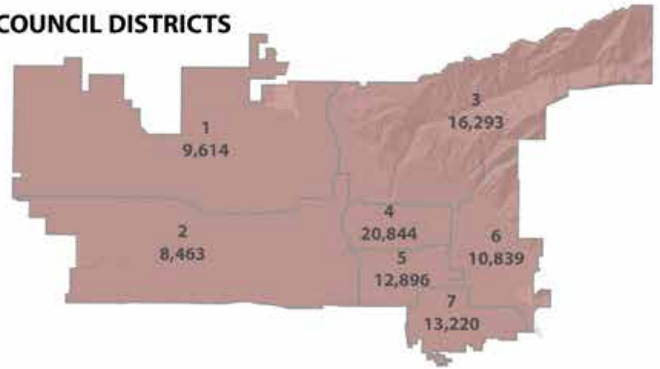
Figure 5: Total Housing Units

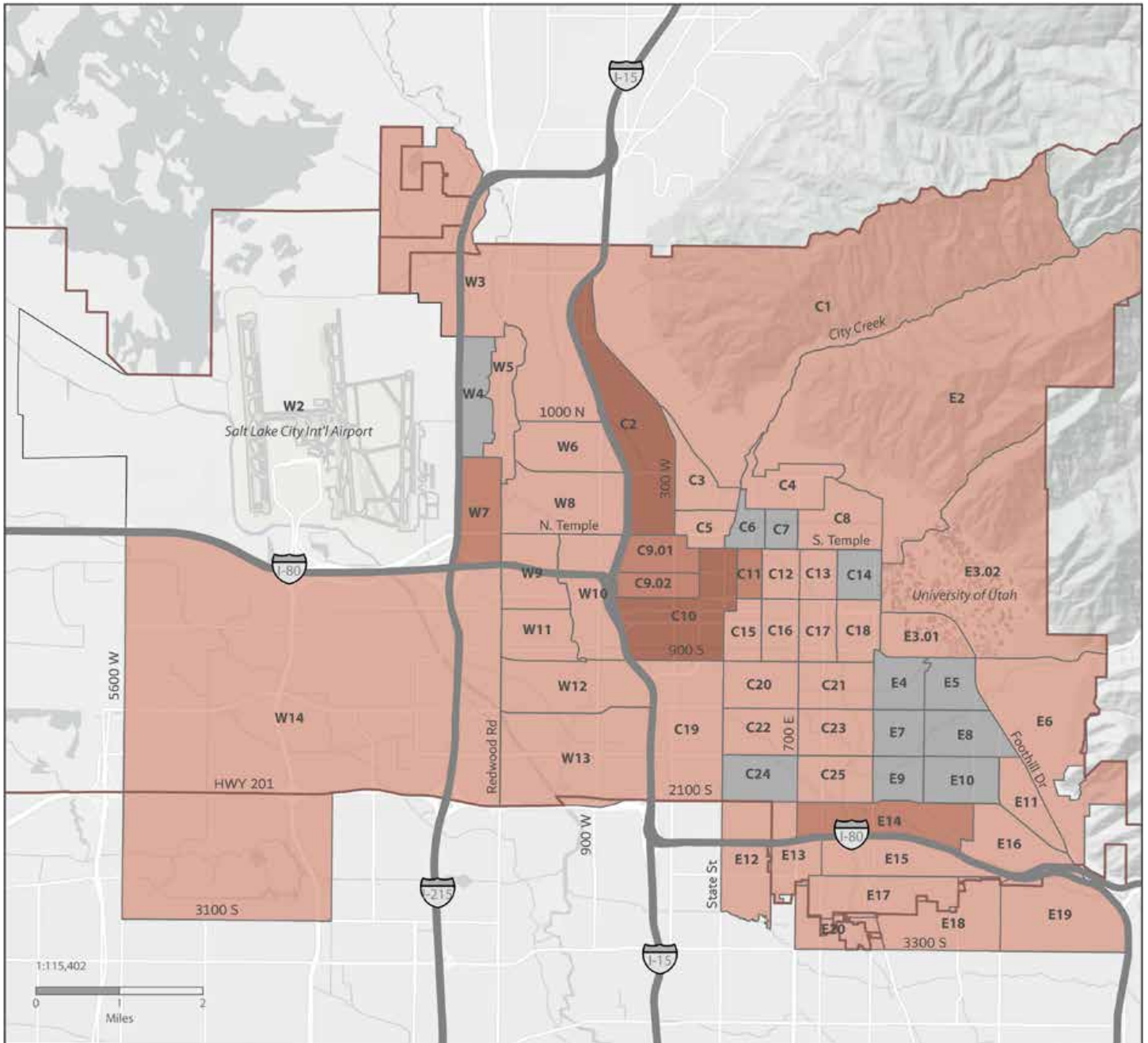
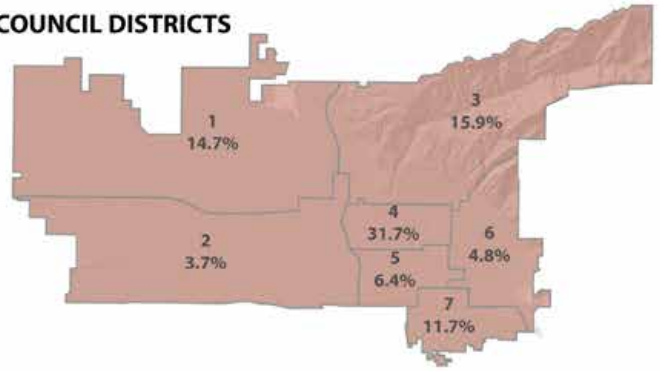

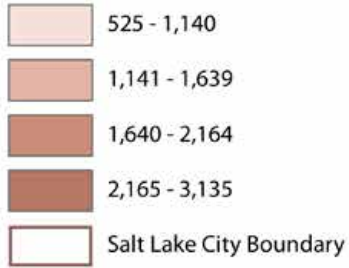

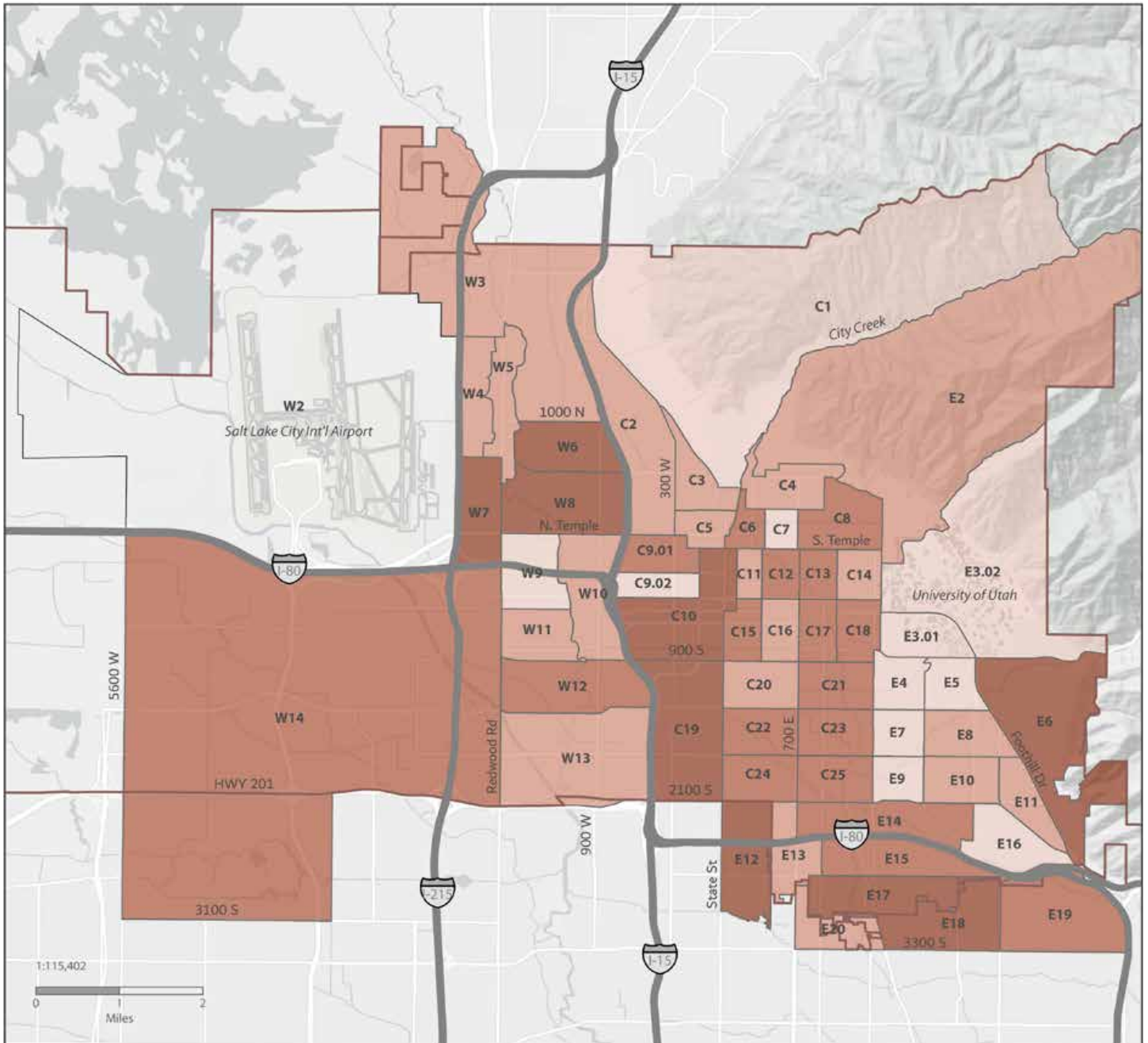
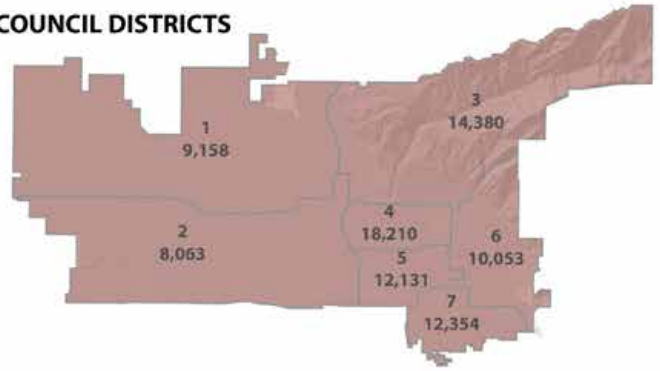
Figure 7: Occupied Housing Units

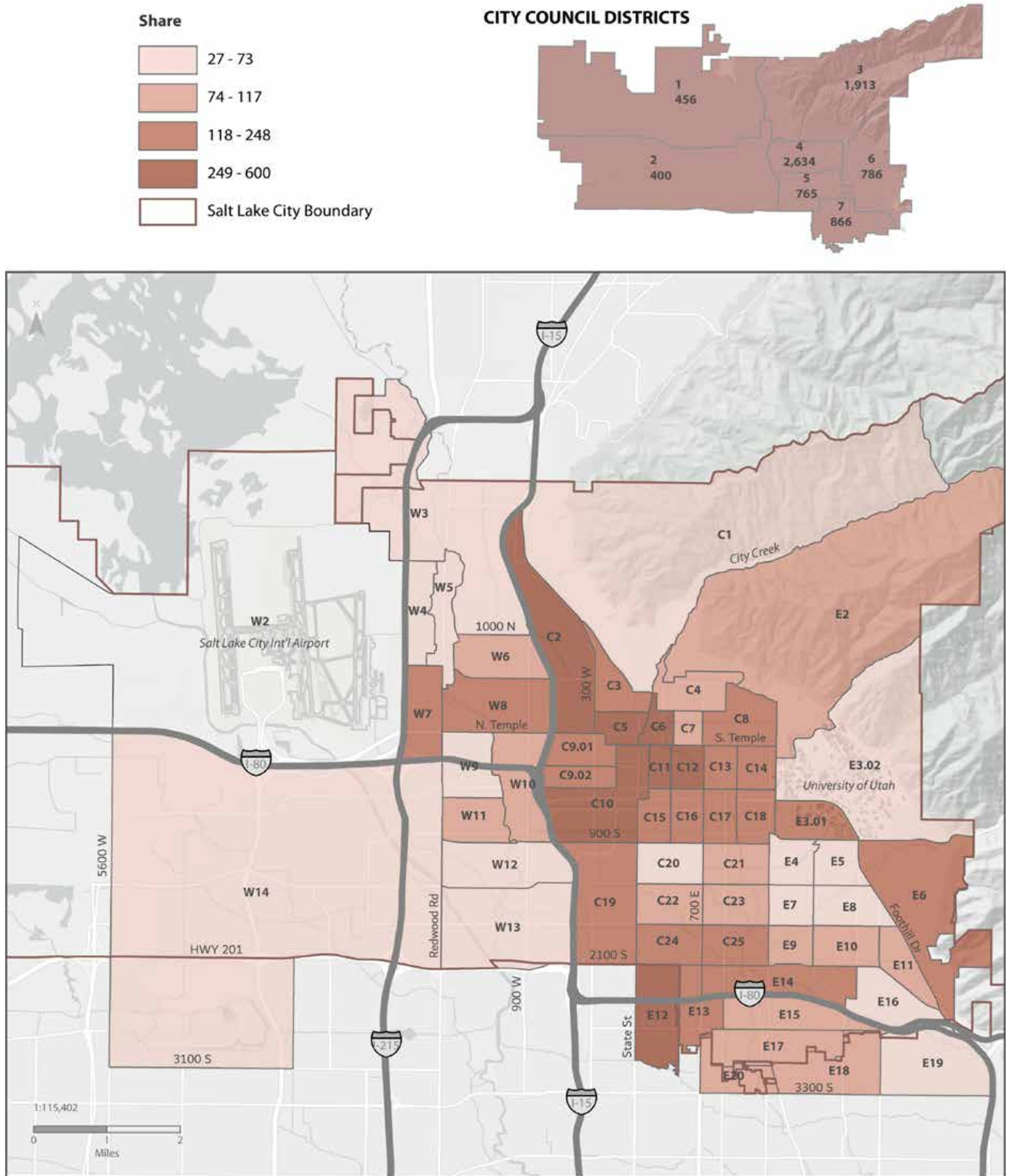

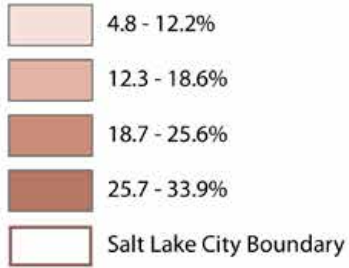

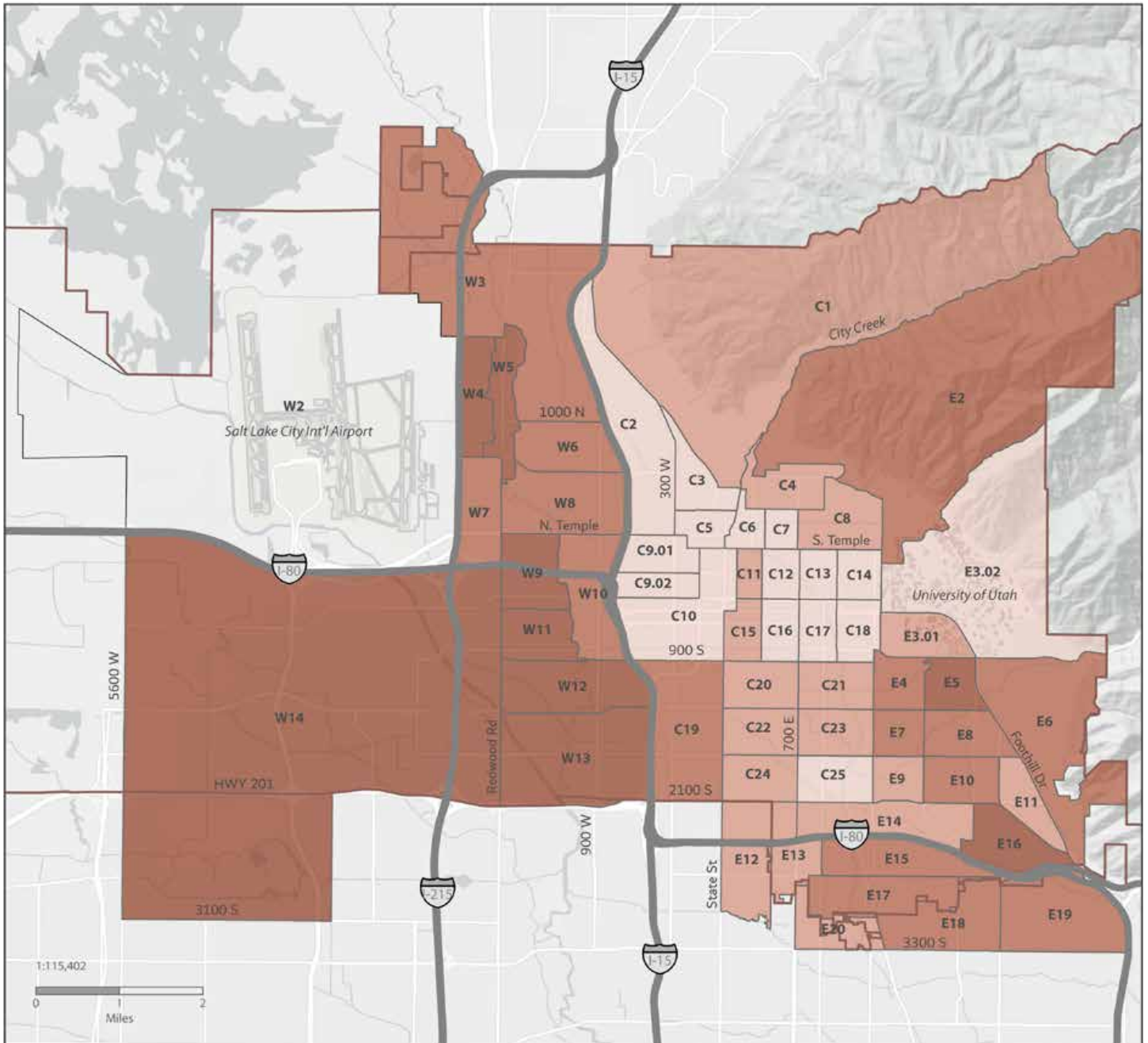
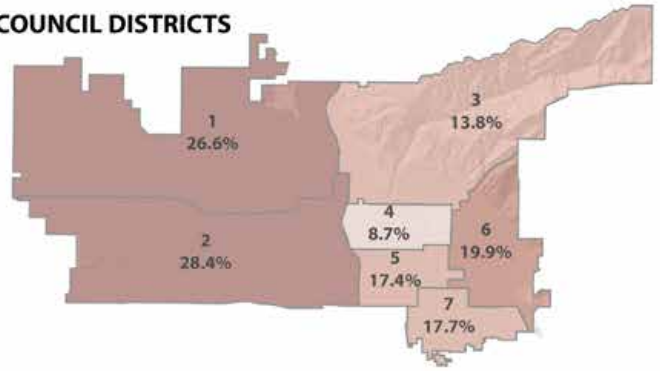

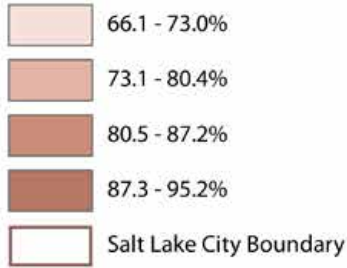

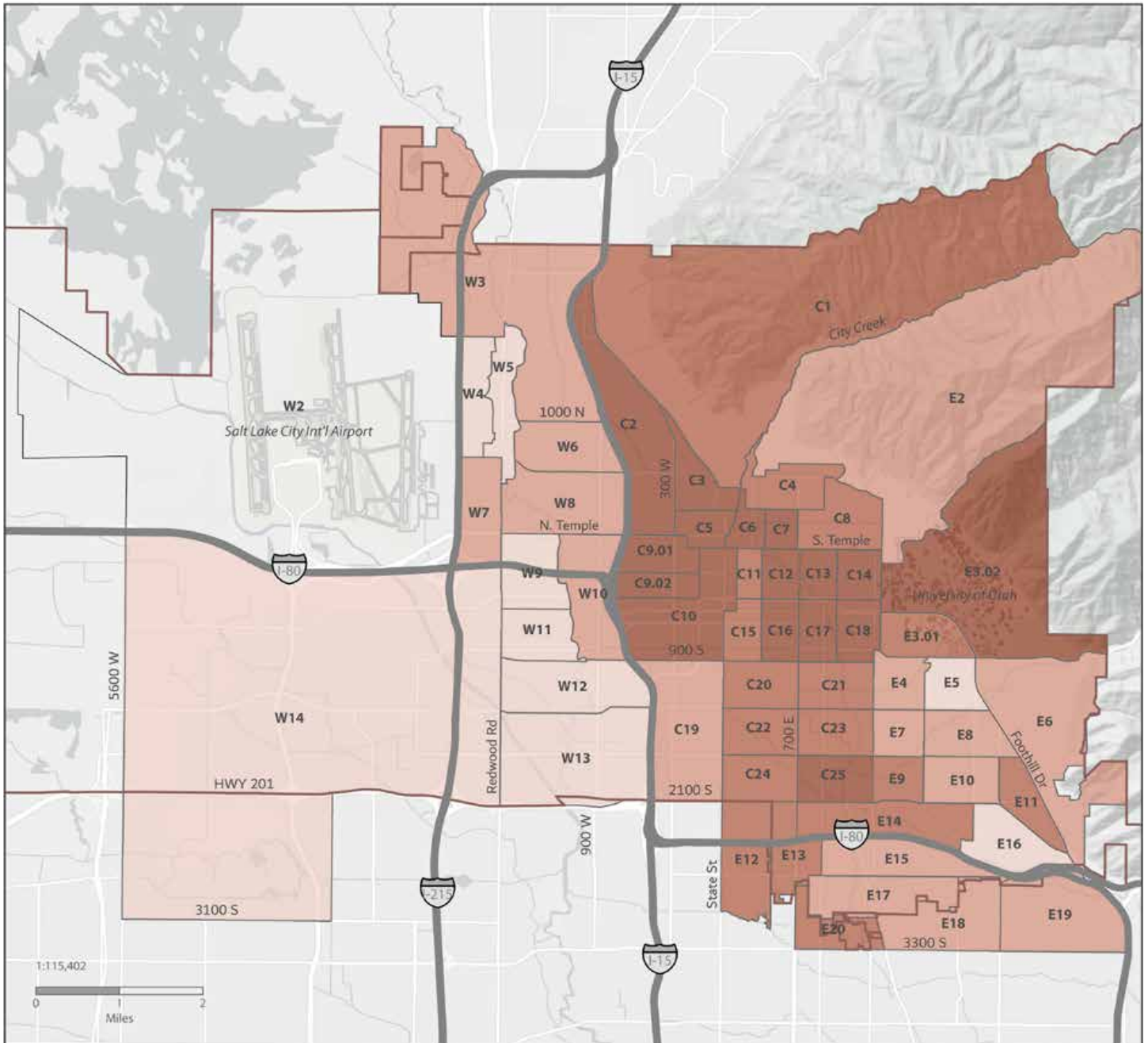
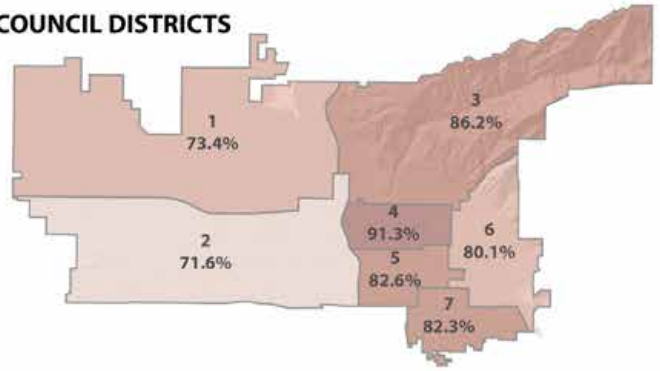

Race and Hispanic or Latino origin

Over two-thirds of new Salt Lake City residents identified as racial or ethnic populations outside non-Hispanic White. Statewide, this share was just over half.

The racial and ethnic diversity of Salt Lake City residents increased from 2010 to 2020.³ In 2020, 63.4% of the population identified as White, the 8th lowest share of cities with a population over 20,000 in the state. The population identifying as Hispanic or Latino was the second largest in the City, at 41,504 residents or 20.8%. These two populations were the only racial or ethnic populations that experienced declines as a share of the population between 2010 and 2020.

Three other populations (Black or African American, Asian, and the combined groups of Two or More Races and Some Other Race) increased as a share of the citywide population. The American Indian or Alaska Native and Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander populations remained at the same share as in 2010.

In general, census tracts west of State Street had higher shares of racial and ethnic diversity among residents. These tracts have higher shares of the population identifying as Hispanic or Latino, Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, Some Other Race, and Two or More Races. The share of the population identifying as Asian lives throughout the City. In the east bench areas, except for the University of Utah, 80% or more of the population identified as non-Hispanic White.

Hispanic or Latino

The Hispanic or Latino population in Salt Lake is the city's second-largest racial or ethnic population. However, the share of Salt Lake City's population identifying as Hispanic or Latino slightly decreased between 2010 and 2020, resulting in 20.8% (41,504) Hispanic or Latino residents. This change is in contrast to the county and state. In Salt Lake County, the Hispanic or Latino share of the population grew from 17.1% in 2010 to 19.6% in 2020. Statewide, the share increased from 13.0% of the total population to 15.1% (nearly 493,000 residents).

The decline in the Hispanic or Latino population occurred in Districts 1 and 2, which also have the largest shares of Hispanic or Latino residents. The share of the Hispanic or Latino population in the other four districts increased throughout the decade. Every tract in the western portion of Salt Lake has one-third or more residents who identify as Hispanic or Latino, ranging from over 1,800 to 3,213 residents. Tract E16 has the lowest share at 3.0% (63 residents)

Non-Hispanic Asian

The population identifying as non-Hispanic Asian in Salt Lake City increased by 33.0% (2,689 residents) between 2010 and 2020. This increase resulted in the non-Hispanic Asian population being the third-largest racial or ethnic population at 10,840 (5.4%) residents. Districts 6 and 4 have the highest shares of the population who identify as Asian, at 8.4% and 8.2%, respectively. Tract E3.01 has the highest share of Asian residents, at 28.5%. Four other tracts have at least 10% of their population identifying as Asian - E3.02, W14, C12, C13.

Non-Hispanic Multiracial

Salt Lake City's multiracial population more than doubled between 2010 and 2020, reflecting similar large increases in this population statewide and the nation. The addition of 4,508 residents identifying as multiracial resulted in a total population of 8,448 (4.2%) residents in 2020. City Council Districts 3, 5, and 4 have the highest shares at 4.9%, 4.8%, and 4.7%, respectively. Twenty-nine tracts, primarily located in the Central portion of Salt Lake, have higher shares of multiracial residents than the City. Tracts C8 and C9.01 both have shares of over 6%.

Non-Hispanic Black or African-American, American Indian or Alaska Native, Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, and Some Other Race

These four racial or ethnic groups represent 6.1% of the Salt Lake City population, with the Black or African-American population being the largest of the three at 2.7% citywide (over 4,200 people). The non-Hispanic Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander population represents 2.0% of Salt Lake City residents, 0.8% identify as non-Hispanic American Indian or Alaska Native, and 0.6% identify as non-Hispanic Some Other Race. City Council Districts 1, 2, and 4 were home to the largest shares of these populations. Details for each district are below:

- District 1–non-Hispanic Black or African American population (4.1%)
- District 2–non-Hispanic American Indian or Alaska Native populations (1.1%) and non-Hispanic Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander (7.0%)
- District 4–non-Hispanic American Indian or Alaska Native populations (1.1%) and non-Hispanic Some Other Race (0.7%)

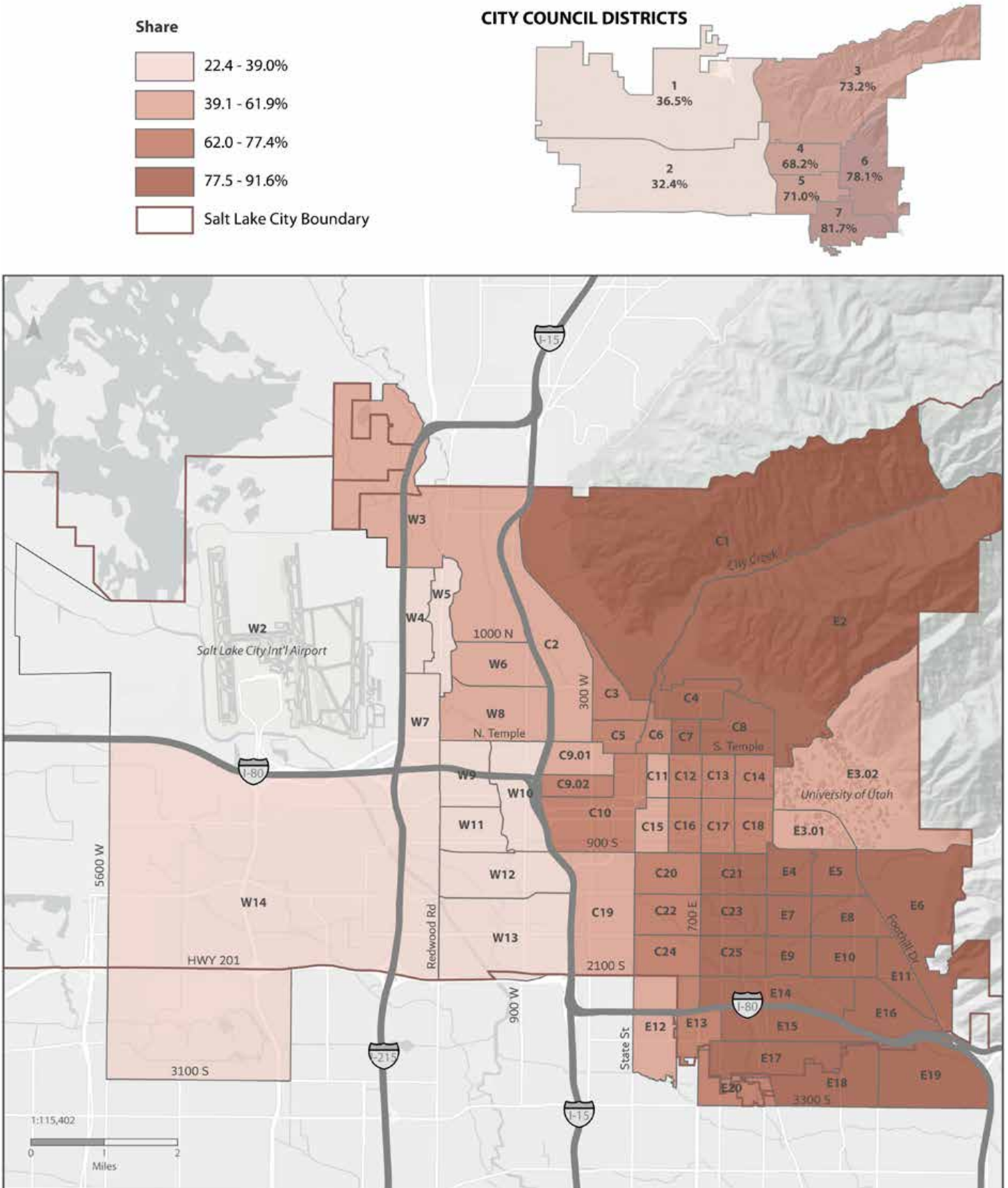
The central and western tracts in Salt Lake are more likely to have higher shares of these smaller racial and ethnic populations than the eastern tracts. Twenty tracts across the central and western portions of the City have higher shares of residents identifying as non-Hispanic Black or African-American than the City. Four (W13, C19, C11, and W5) have shares of 6% or higher. Twenty-three tracts have higher shares of non-Hispanic American Indian or Alaska Native residents than the City in the central and western areas. Tract W13 has the highest share of residents identifying as non-Hispanic Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islanders. The additional 12 tracts with higher shares of non-Hispanic Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander residents are all in the western part of the City.

Data Note:

This analysis uses an exclusive group approach to follow past practices. The exclusive group approach allows for the shares of the included racial or ethnic populations in the City to sum to 100%. Each population mentioned in this section refers to the non-Hispanic population, except for Hispanic or Latino, which includes residents of any race who identified as Hispanic or Latino.

This approach is helpful for a high-level look at the population but limits insights for many populations. A supplemental report provides additional insights into the multiracial population to provide another layer of analysis.

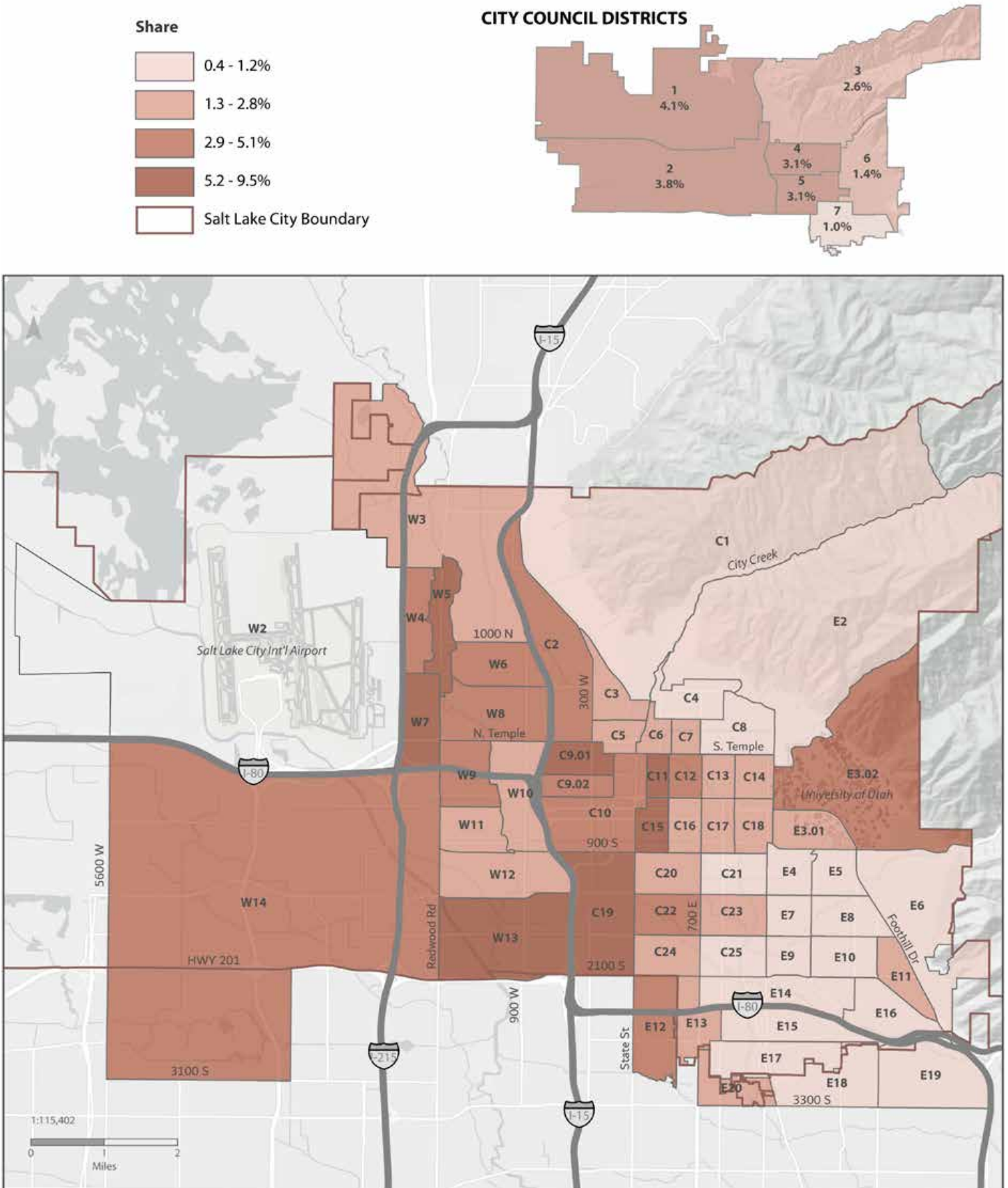

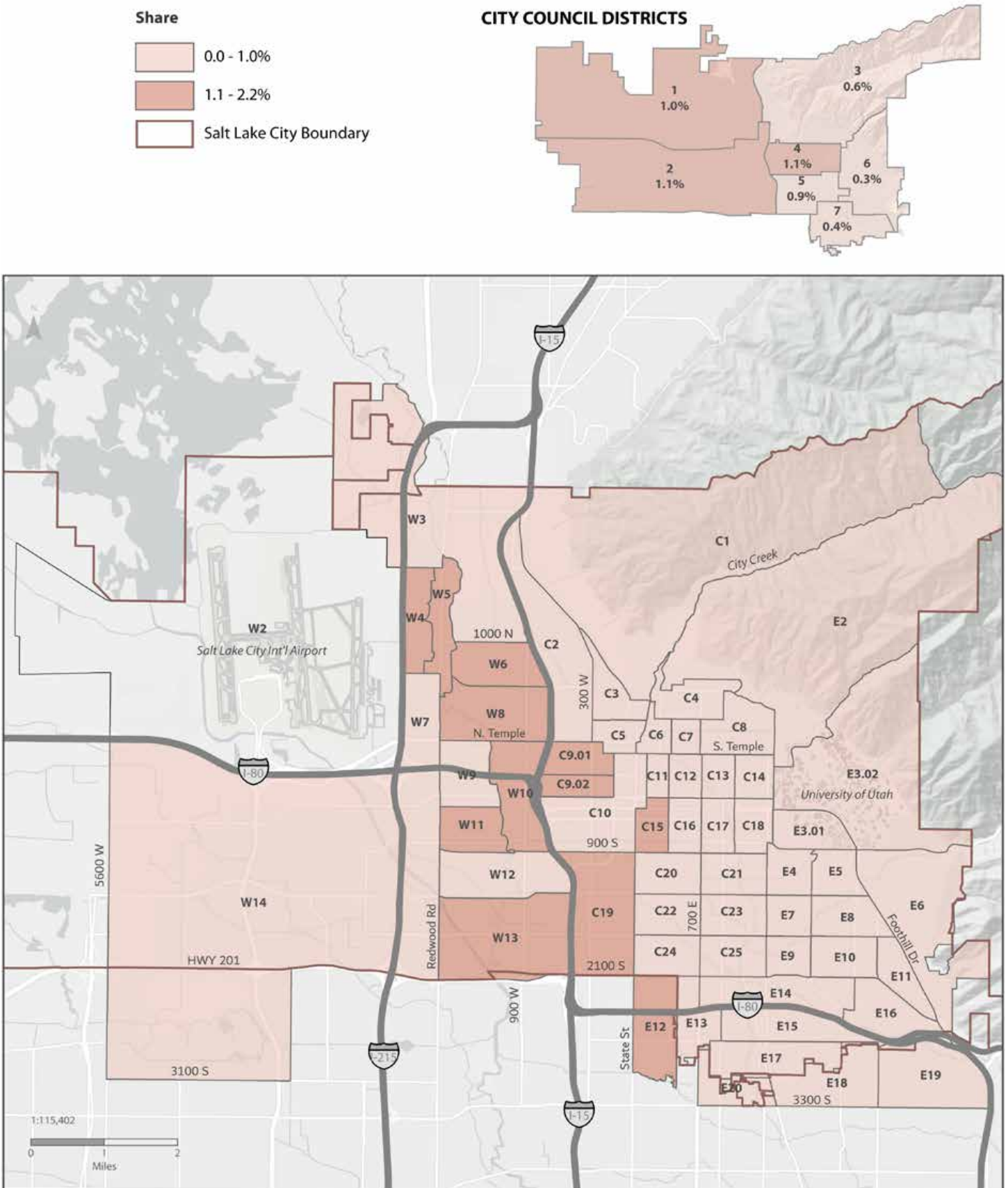

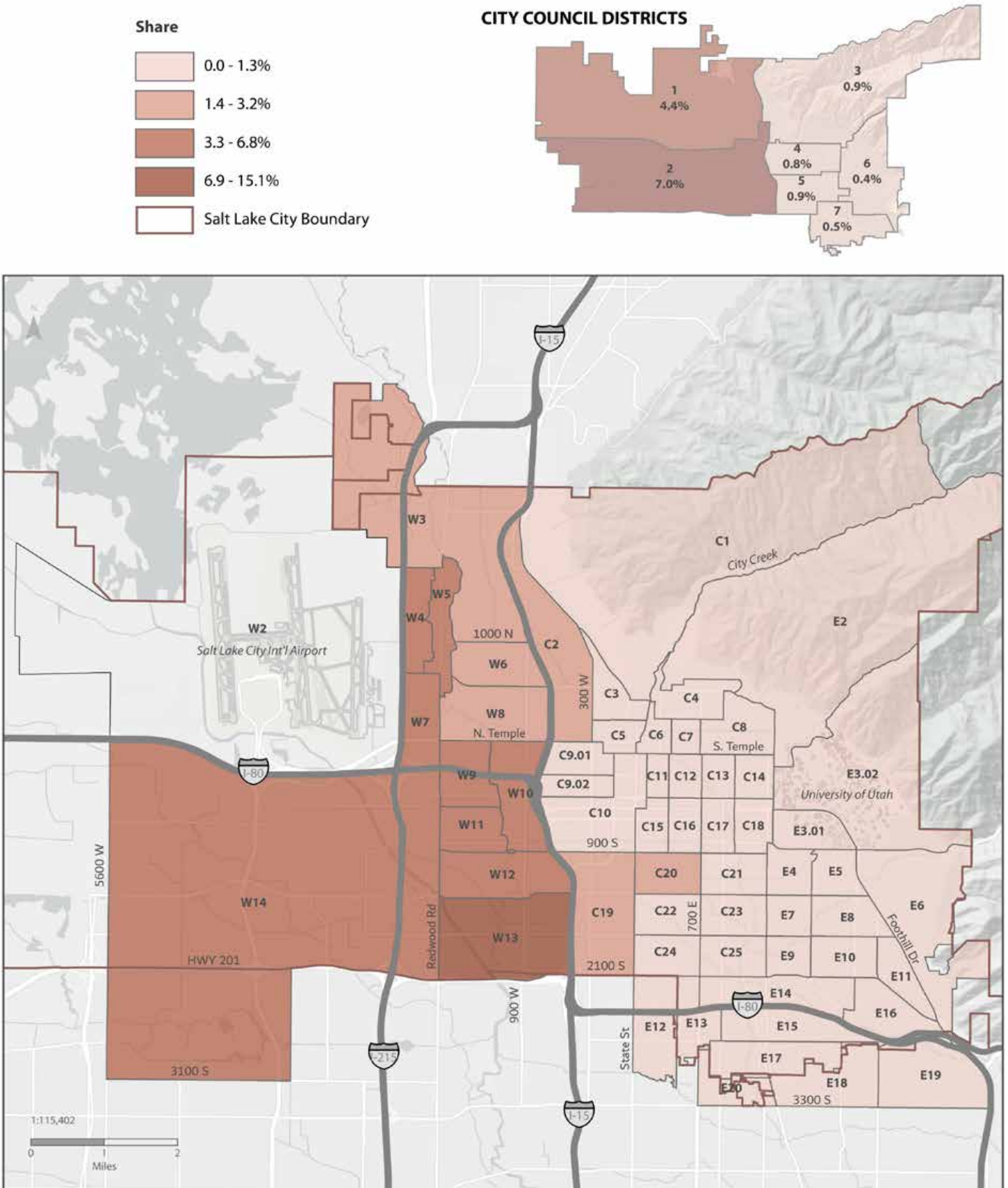

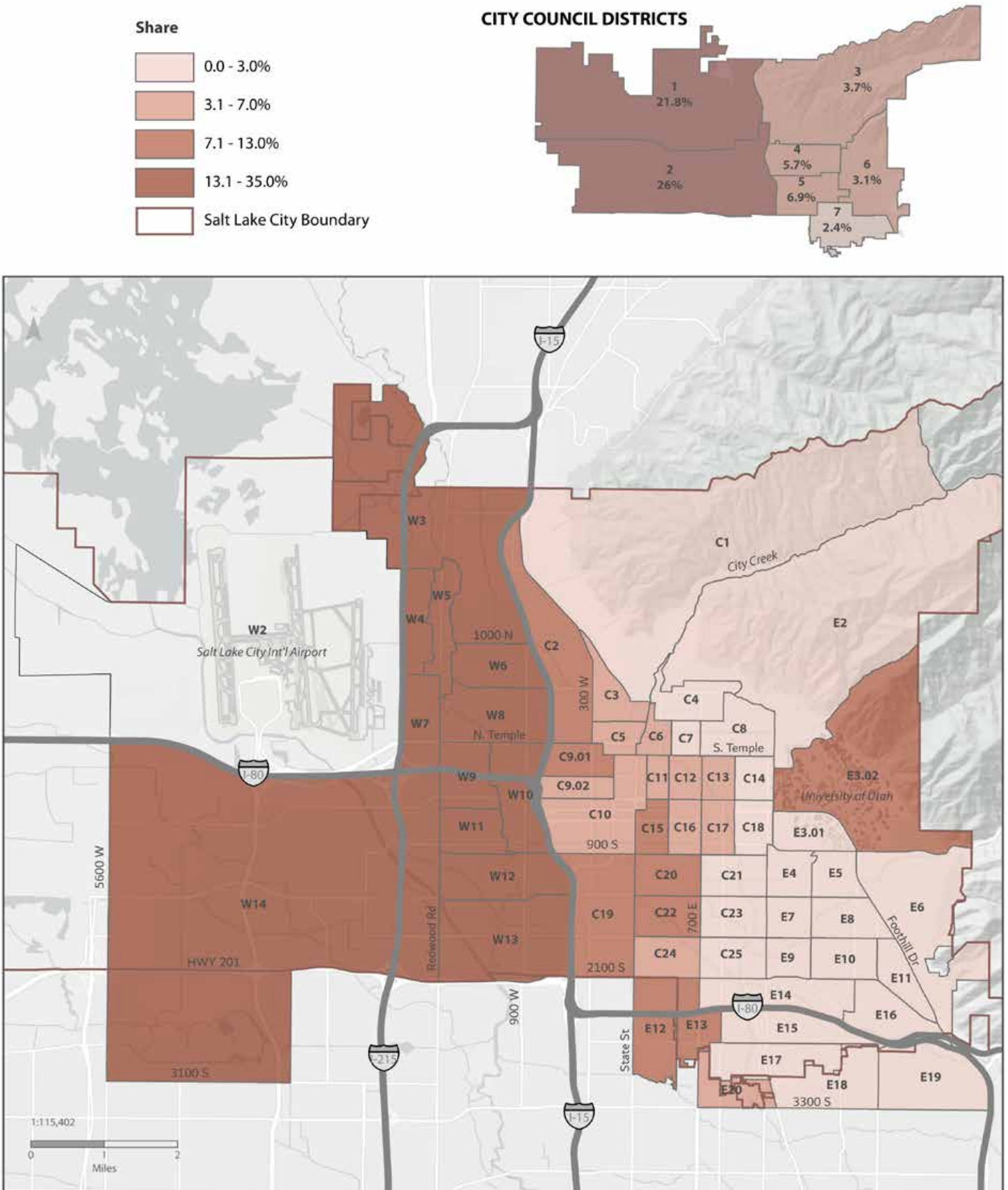

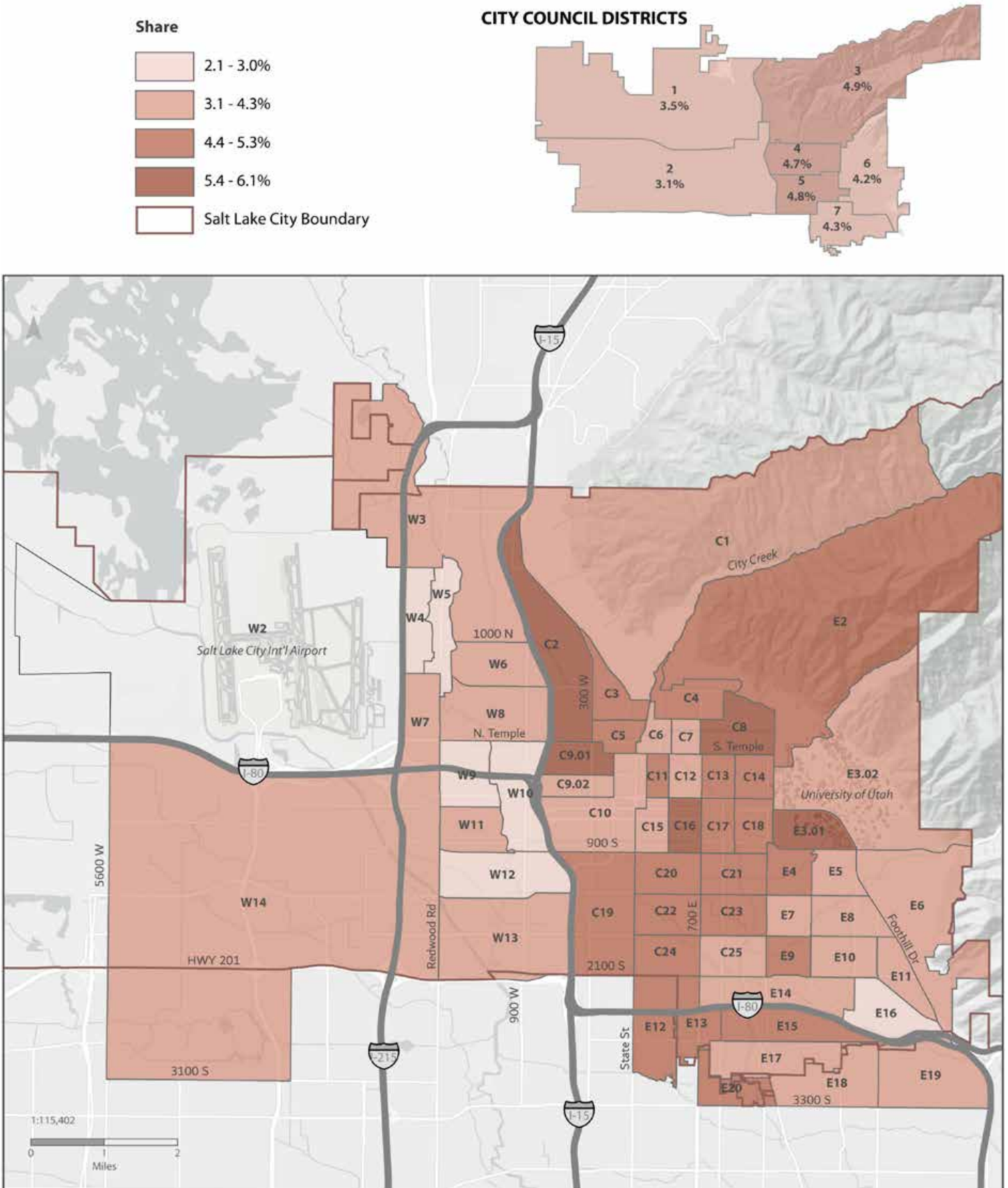

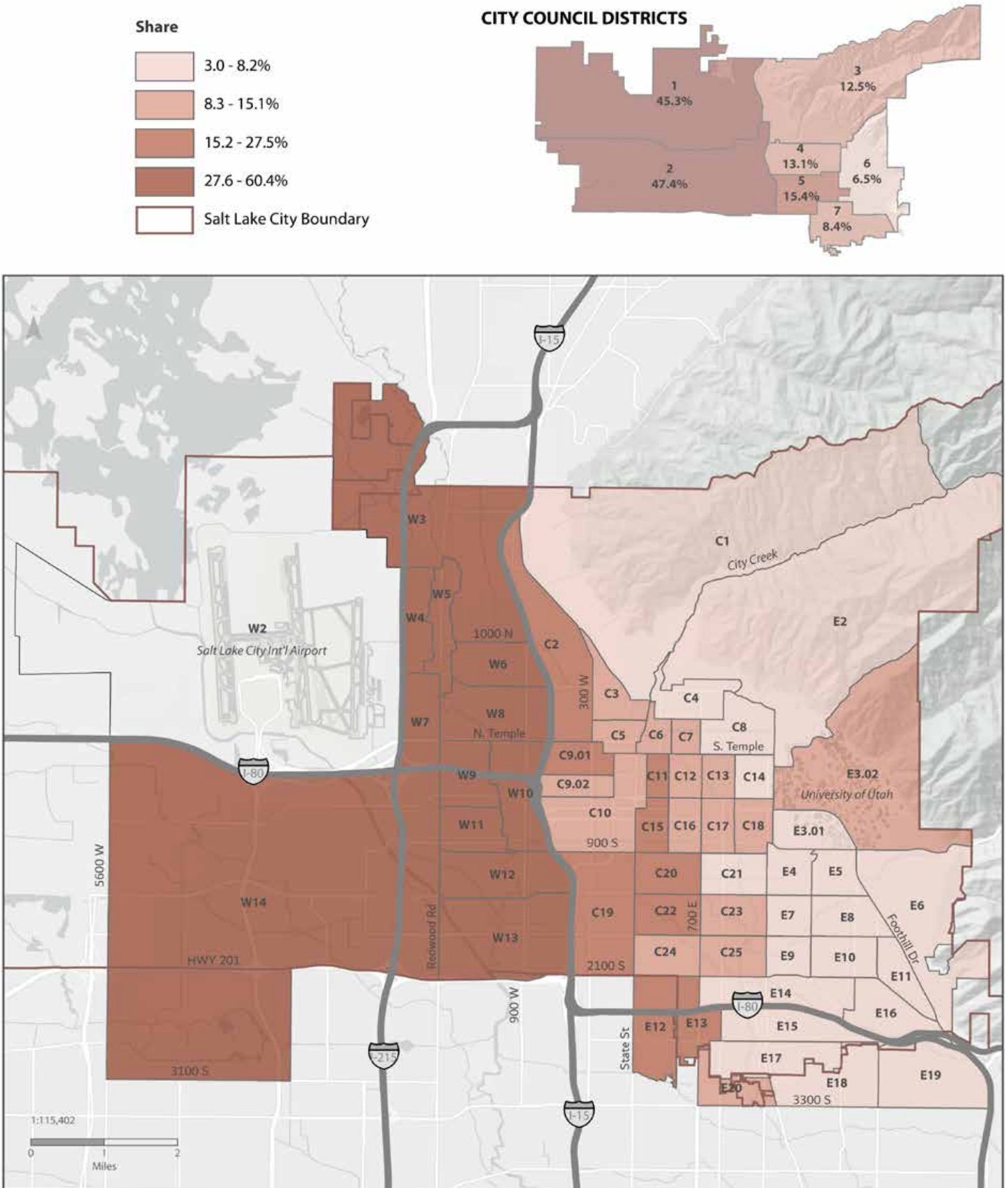

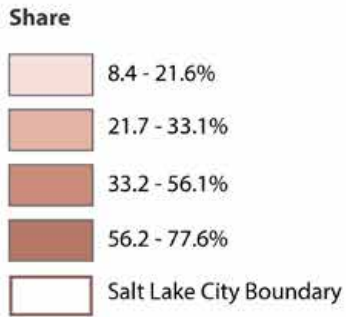

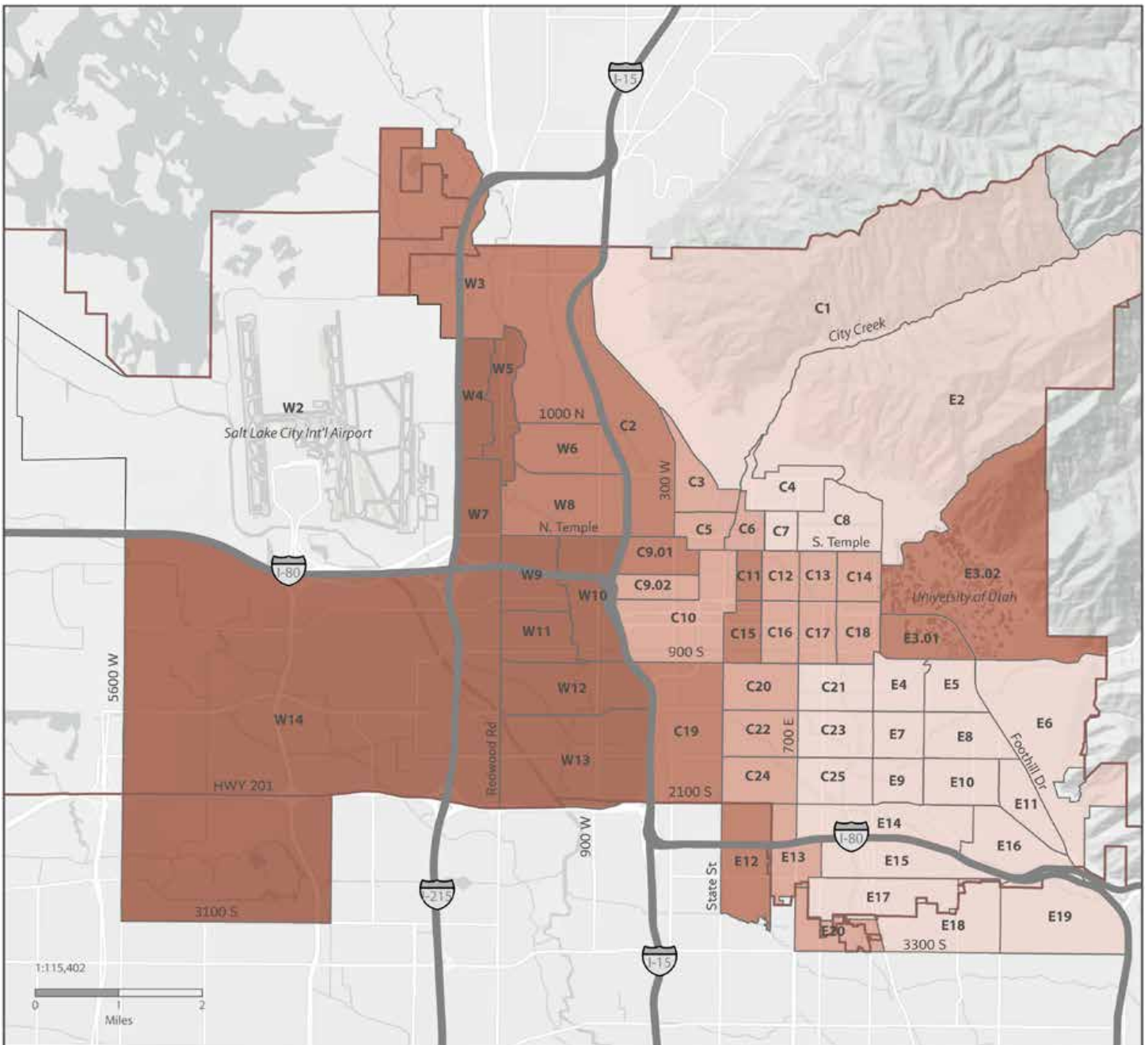
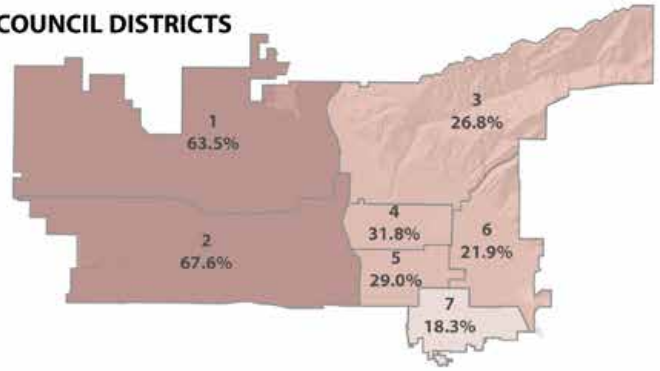

Households

Utah's capital city displays some unique household characteristics. Salt Lake City had the highest share of non-family households of any city in the state at 50.9%. The city also had the third lowest share of households with children under 18 at 22.5%. These trends were driven by many working and college-age individuals living downtown and by the University of Utah. All types of family households were concentrated on the city's west side and near the East Bench. Neighborhoods with older residents were found in the upper Avenues, Rose Park, Capitol Hill, and the East Bench.

Average Household Size

Utah had the largest average household size in the nation at 3.09. However, Salt Lake City is below the national average (2.60) at 2.37. The southwest part of the city was home to the largest household sizes. City Council District 2 had an average household size of 3.32. Conversely, the smallest household sizes were located downtown, with City Council District 4 having an average household size of 1.72. W13 had the largest average household size of any tract at 4.18, while the lowest was C11 at 1.40.

Households with persons under 18 or over 60

Salt Lake City had a much lower share of households with children under 18 (22.5%) compared to the state (40.2%). Within the city, these households were typically located on the west side, though two eastern tracts also had large shares. City Council District 2 had the highest share of these households at 39.6%, and District 4 had the lowest at only 6.7%. Three tracts downtown had shares below 5% (C10, C12, and C15), while four tracts on the east and west side had shares equal to or above 45% (E7, E8, W13, and W14).

Salt Lake City had a similar share of households with people over 60 (29.0%) as the state (32.6%). These older households were located in the northern and eastern portions of the city. Among city council districts, District 6 had the highest proportion at 38.1%, while District 4 had the lowest at 19.9%. Only two tracts had shares below 10% (C13 and E3.02). Two eastern tracts had shares exceeding 50% (E2 and E6).

Family Households

Nearly 3 of every 4 households statewide were family households. In Salt Lake City, the share was almost half at 49.1%. City Council Districts 2 and 6 have shares of family households at or above 70%. District 4 has the lowest share at 22.0%. A total of 8 tracts (E2, E16, E19, W4, W5, W12, W13, and W14) had shares of family households above 75%. Four tracts had shares below 20% (C9.01, C9.02, C11, C12, and C15).

Statewide, less than one in three (31.5%) households were married couples with children. In Salt Lake City, this share was even smaller at 15.6%. District 6 had a similar share of these households as the state at 27.6%. District 4 had the lowest share at 4.0%. There are only three tracts where married-couple family households with children accounted for one-third or more of the total households (E7, E8, and W14). A total of 9 central tracts had shares of these households less than 5% (C5, C9.01, C10, C11, C12, C13, C14, C15, and C18).

At the state level, 8.4% of households were single parents with children. The share was slightly lower in Salt Lake City at 6.9%. Of the city council districts, District 2 had the highest share of single-parent households at 16.1%, while District 4 had the lowest at 2.7%. Eight tracts had shares of single-parent households below 2%, with three having shares of 0.0% (C12, C25, E3.02). Conversely, in tract W13, over one-quarter of all households were single parents.

In Utah, just over a quarter of households were non-family households, which includes any households where members have no family relationship as well as those who live alone. In Salt Lake City, this share was over half of all households (50.9%) and was the highest of any city in the state. 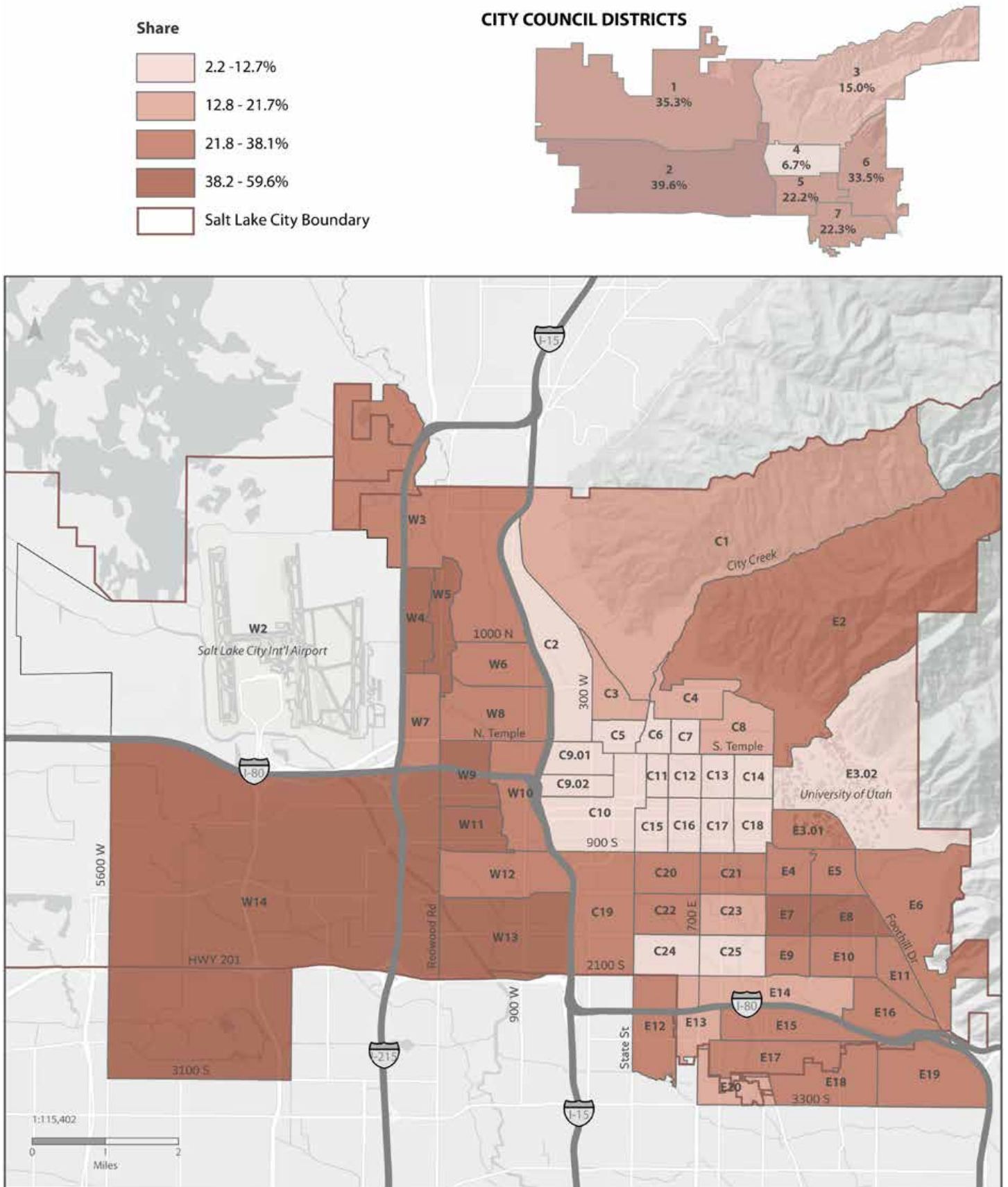

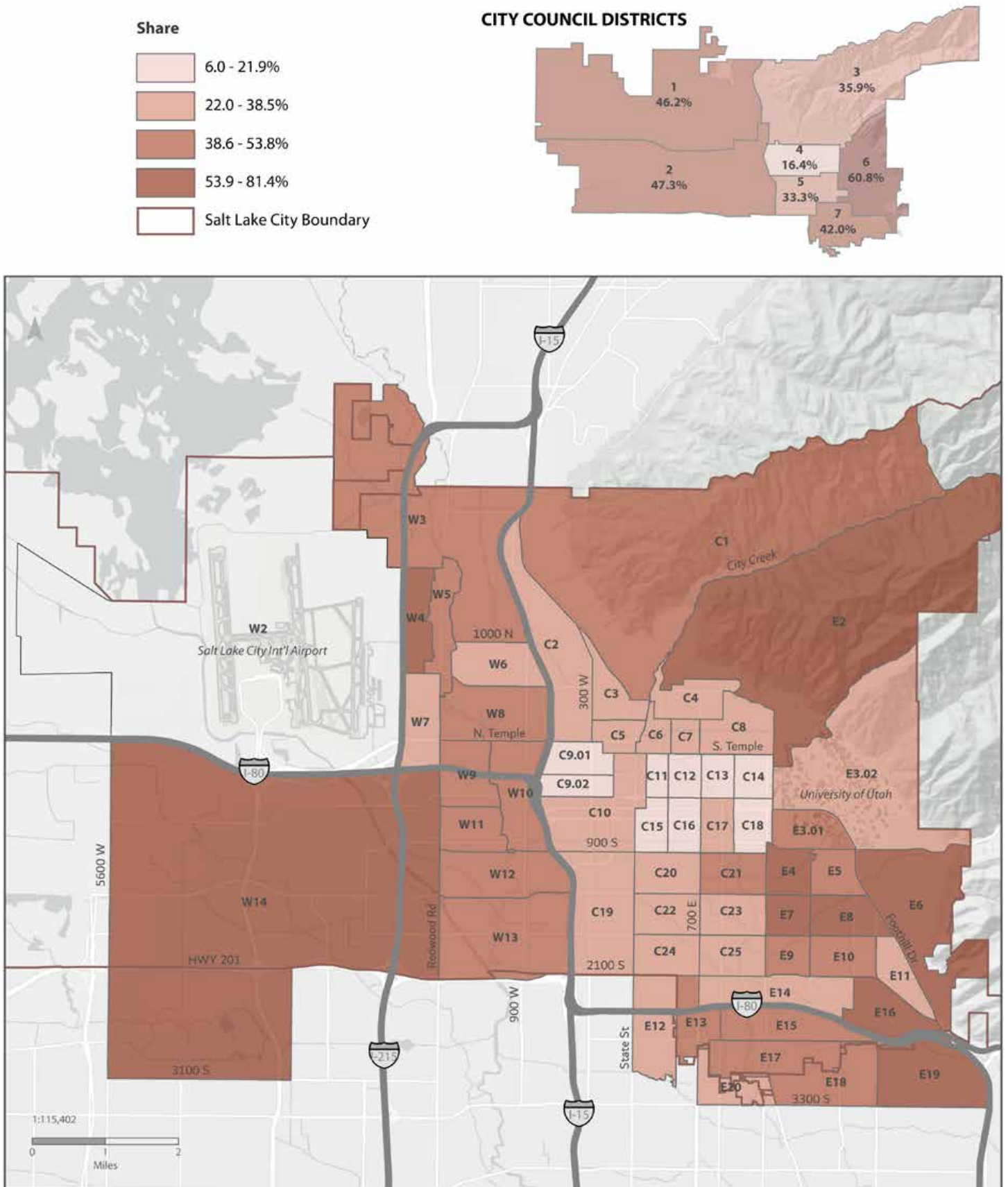

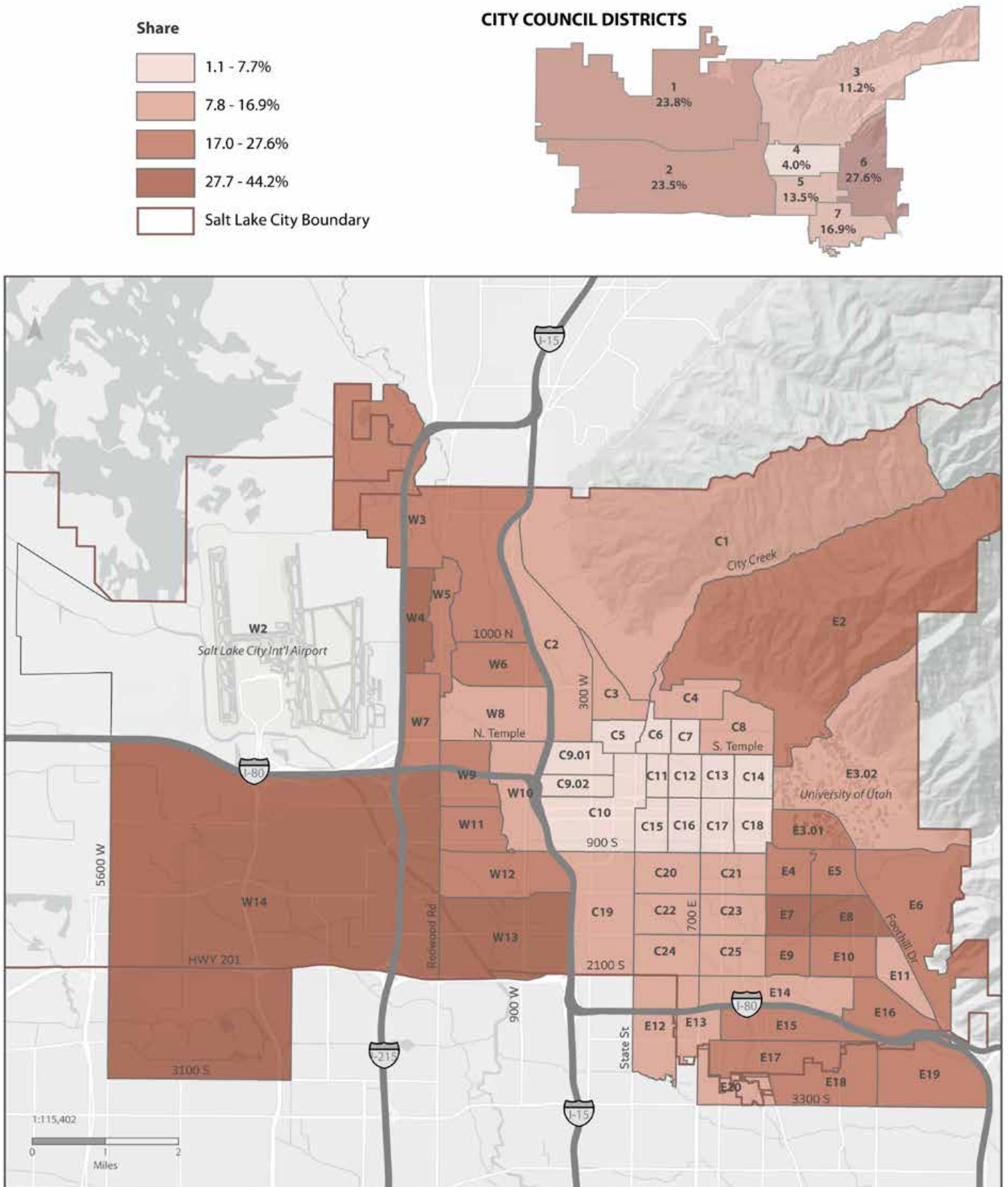

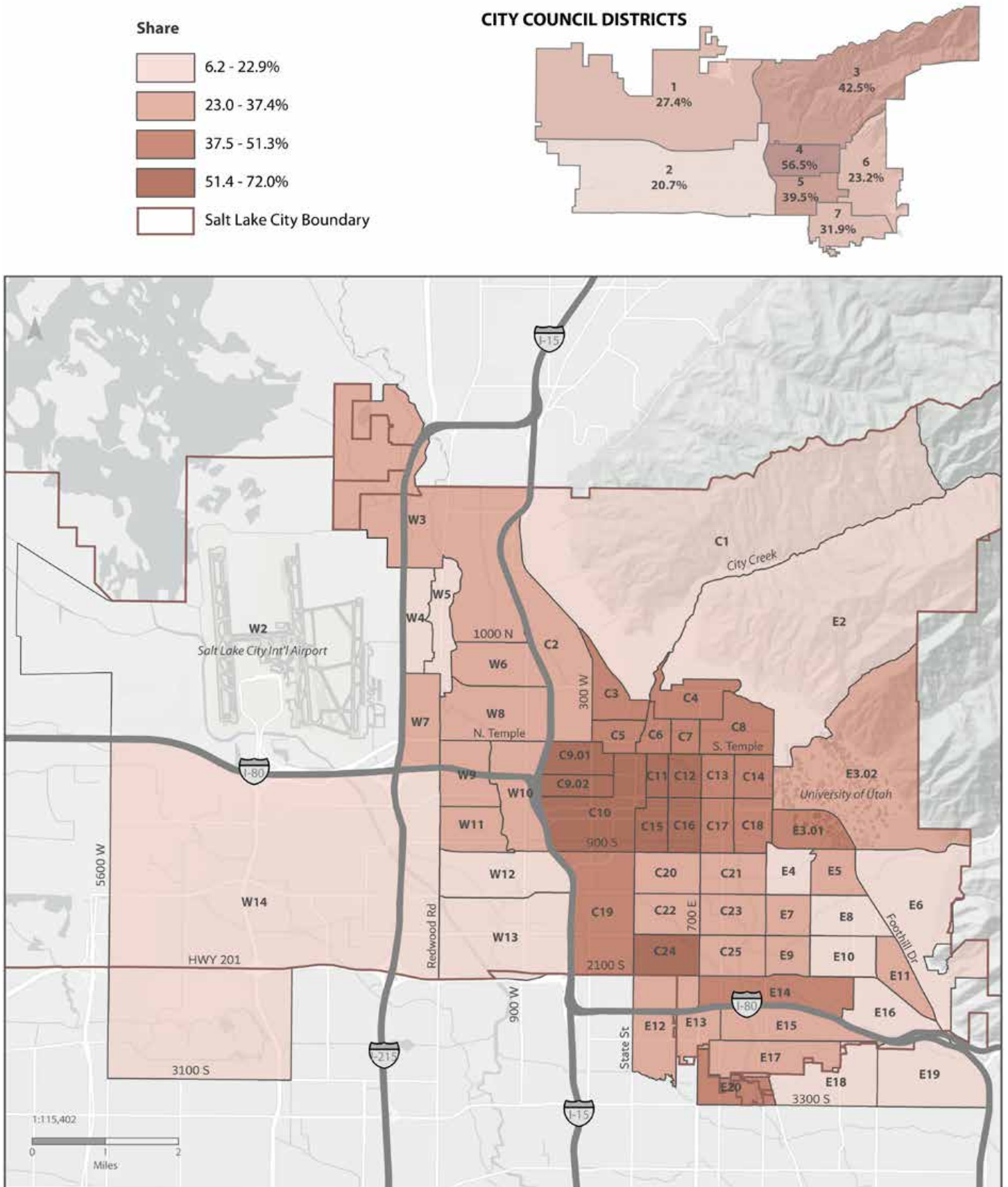

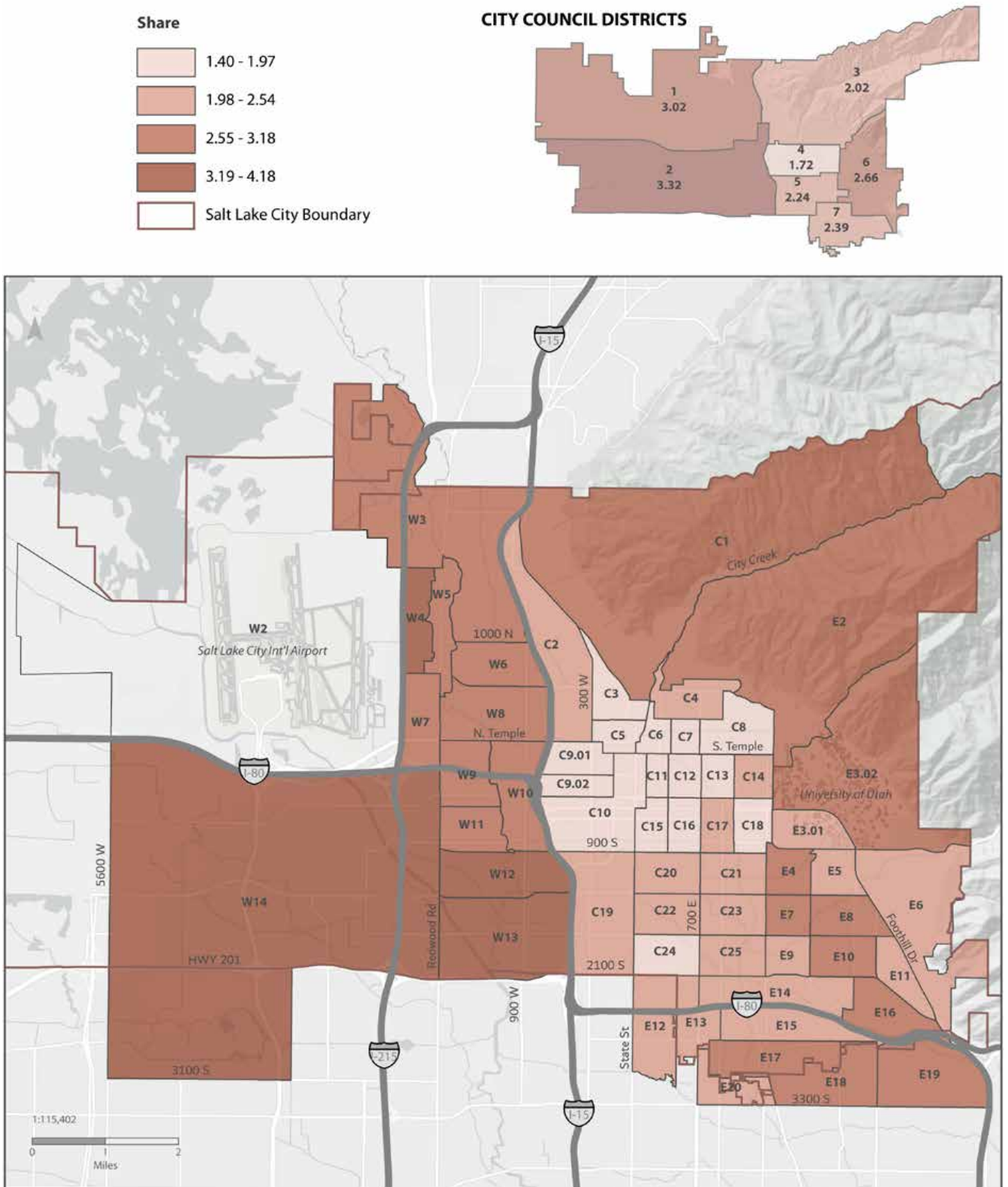

As the state capital and home of the state's flagship university, Salt Lake City exhibits interesting socioeconomic characteristics. Despite experiencing higher educational attainment for adult residents than the state, Salt Lake City had a higher share of households with incomes below the poverty level and a lower median income. Average household incomes between the highest earning City Council District and the lowest had a gap of over \$65,000. Salt Lake City attracted foreign-born individuals at nearly twice the rate as the state. The city also experienced significant growth from those moving within Utah and other states. Almost one-fifth of Salt Lake City residents moved outside the city boundaries within the past year.

Income and Poverty

In Salt Lake City, 14.0% of households had incomes below the poverty level. This share of households was higher than at the state level (9.1%). Over one-fifth of households in City Council District 4 had incomes below the poverty level, while in District 6, the share was only 8.2%. Four tracts (C12, C14, E3.01, and E3.02) had shares of households in poverty above 30%, with E3.02 reaching 43.1%. On the other hand, three eastern tracts had shares equal to or below 2.0% (E2, E4, and E9).

The median household income in Salt Lake City was \$63,156, which was lower than the state (\$74,197). The difference between the highest and lowest household median incomes for city council districts was over \$65,000 (District 6 was the highest and District 4 was the lowest). A total of five tracts had a median household income below \$40,000 (C9.01, C14, C15, E3.01, E3.02). Nine tracts had median household incomes exceeding \$100,000. E2 had the highest median household income, exceeding \$250,001 (the highest value at which the ACS reports household income).

Educational Attainment of the Population Aged 25 Years and Over

Nearly half of all adult residents in Salt Lake City had a Bachelor's degree or higher (48.7%).

This share was nearly 15% higher than the state at 34.7%. In City Council District 6, over three-quarters of the population had a Bachelor's or higher, while in District 1, just over one-fifth

of the population had this level of educational attainment. Three tracts had shares less than 15% (W5, W9, and W12), all of which are on the west side of the city. Alternatively, on the east side, three tracts had shares higher than 75% (E2, E4, and E6).

While the share of those with a secondary education in Salt Lake City was higher than the state, the share of those without a high school diploma was also higher. In Salt Lake City, 10.0% of the population had less than a high school diploma, while at the state level the share is 7.0%. City Council Districts 1 and 2 had shares over 20%, while Districts 3, 4, 6, and 7 had shares below 5%. Four tracts downtown and on the east side had shares of those with less than a high school diploma under 1% (C1, C6, E8, and E9). Six tracts on the west side had shares above 25% (W6, W7, W8, W9, W11, and W12).

Foreign-born

The proportion of the foreign-born population in Salt Lake City was 16.3%, nearly twice the rate of the state (8.4%). City Council Districts 1 and 2 had the highest shares of the foreign-born population (29.6% and 27.8%), while Districts 3, 5, 6, and 7 had shares below 15%. Two eastern tracts had shares below 5% (E4 and E19). The foreign-born population accounted for over one-third of the population in three western tracts (W5, W7, and W9).

Movers from other states and within Utah

Nearly 5% of residents in Salt Lake City moved here within the last year from another state. In City Council District 4 the rate was 6.9%, while in District 2 only 1.3% of the population moved in from a different state. One tract downtown and another by the University of Utah had shares of in-migration from other states exceeding 15% (C5 and E3.02). Six tracts on the east and west side of the city had shares below 1% (E5, E15, E19, W9, W11, and W12).

Salt Lake City also experienced net in-migration from those moving within the state, with 14.7% of residents moving to the city in the last year. Over one-fifth of City Council District 4 moved to the district from within the state in the previous year. All other districts had rates of at least 10%. Among tracts, the share ranges from 3.8% in W3 to 30.3% in C2.

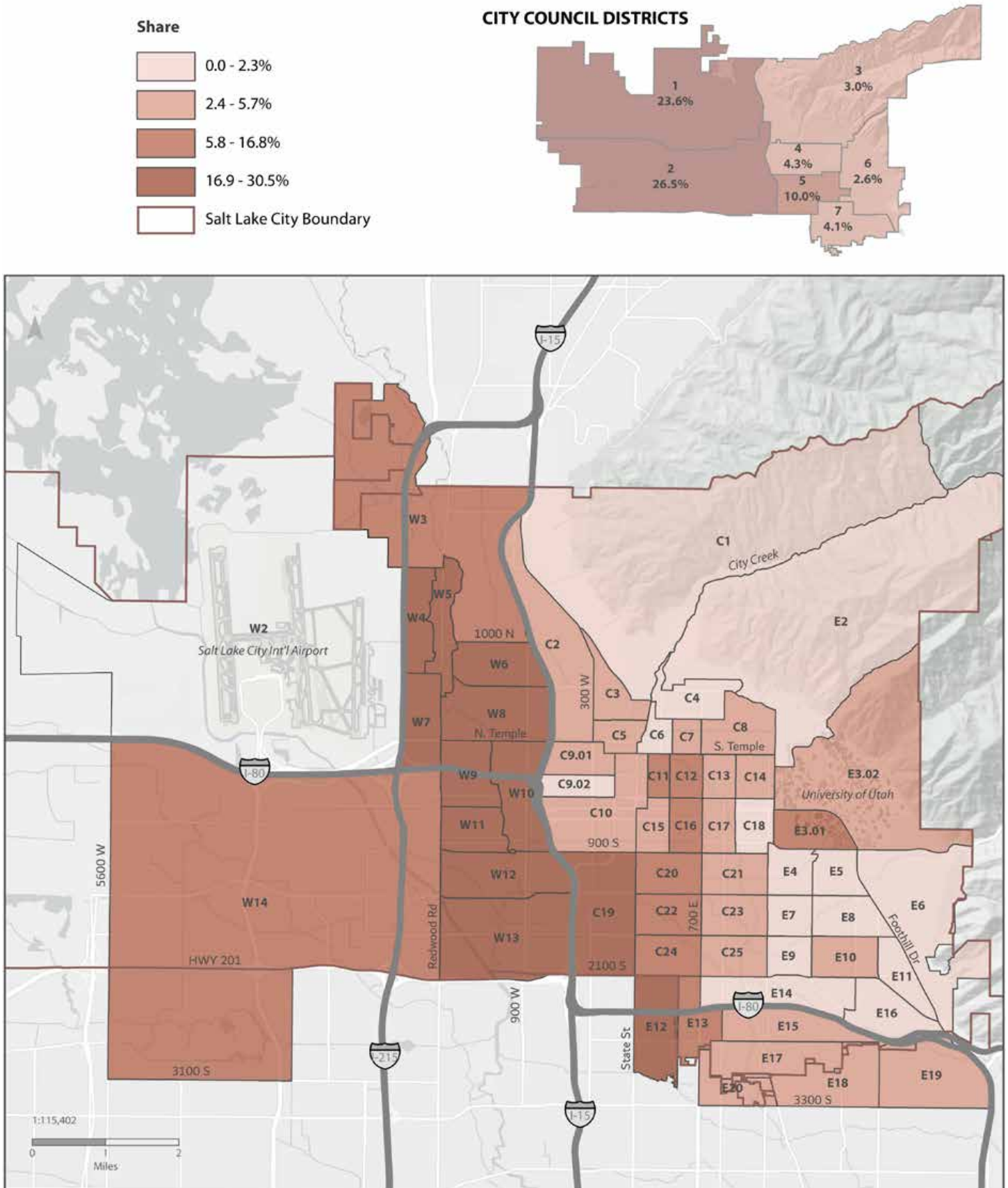

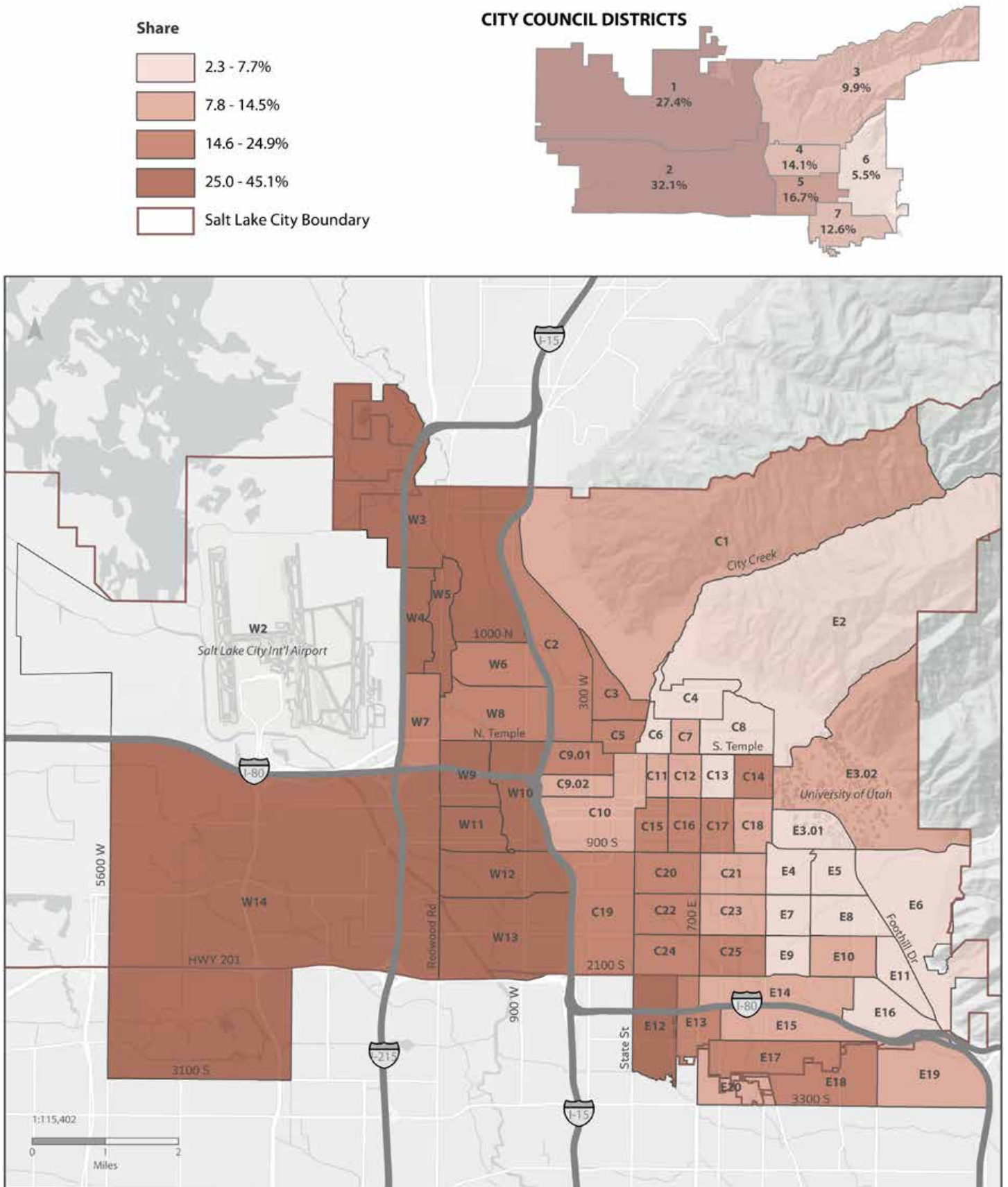

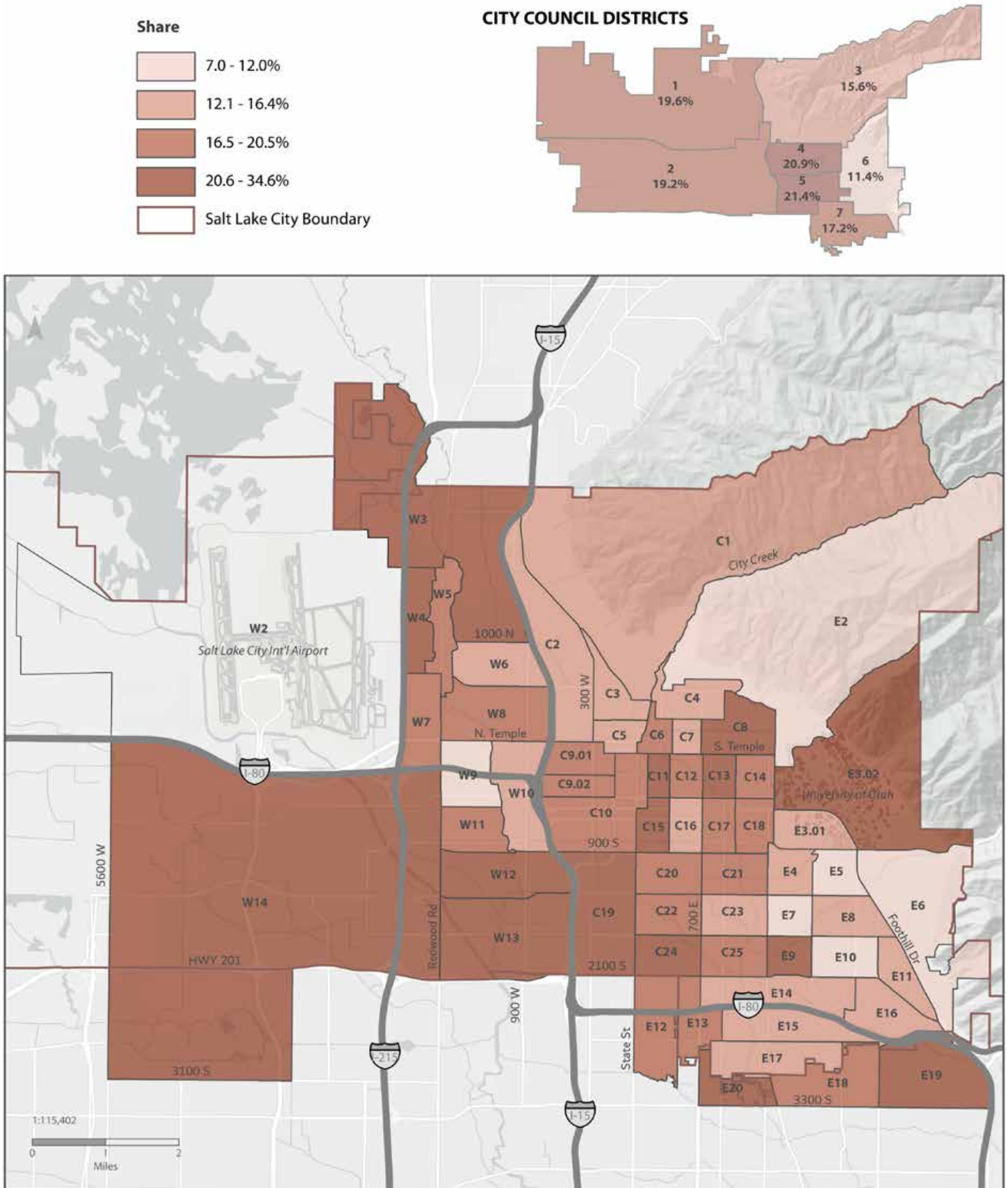

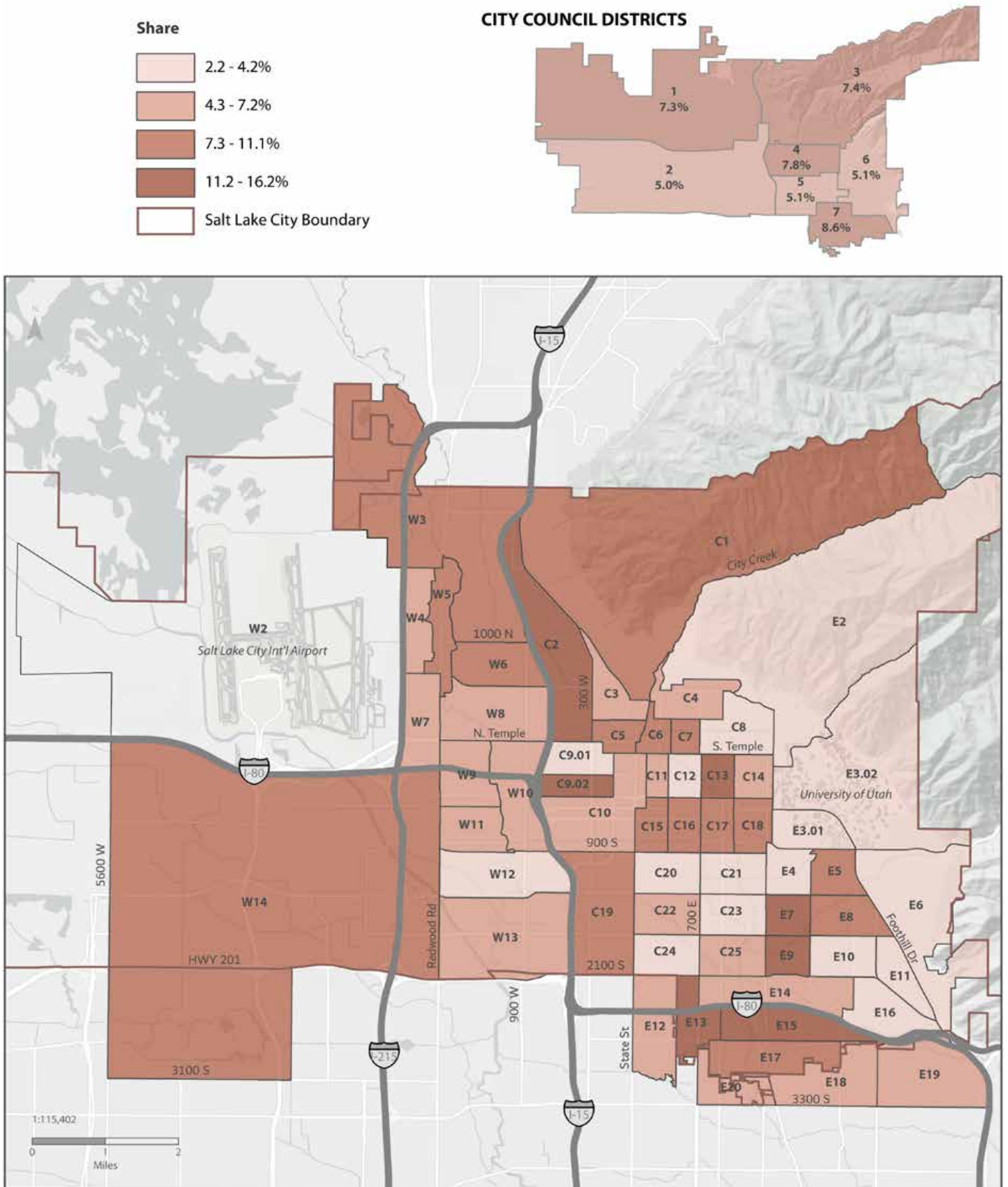

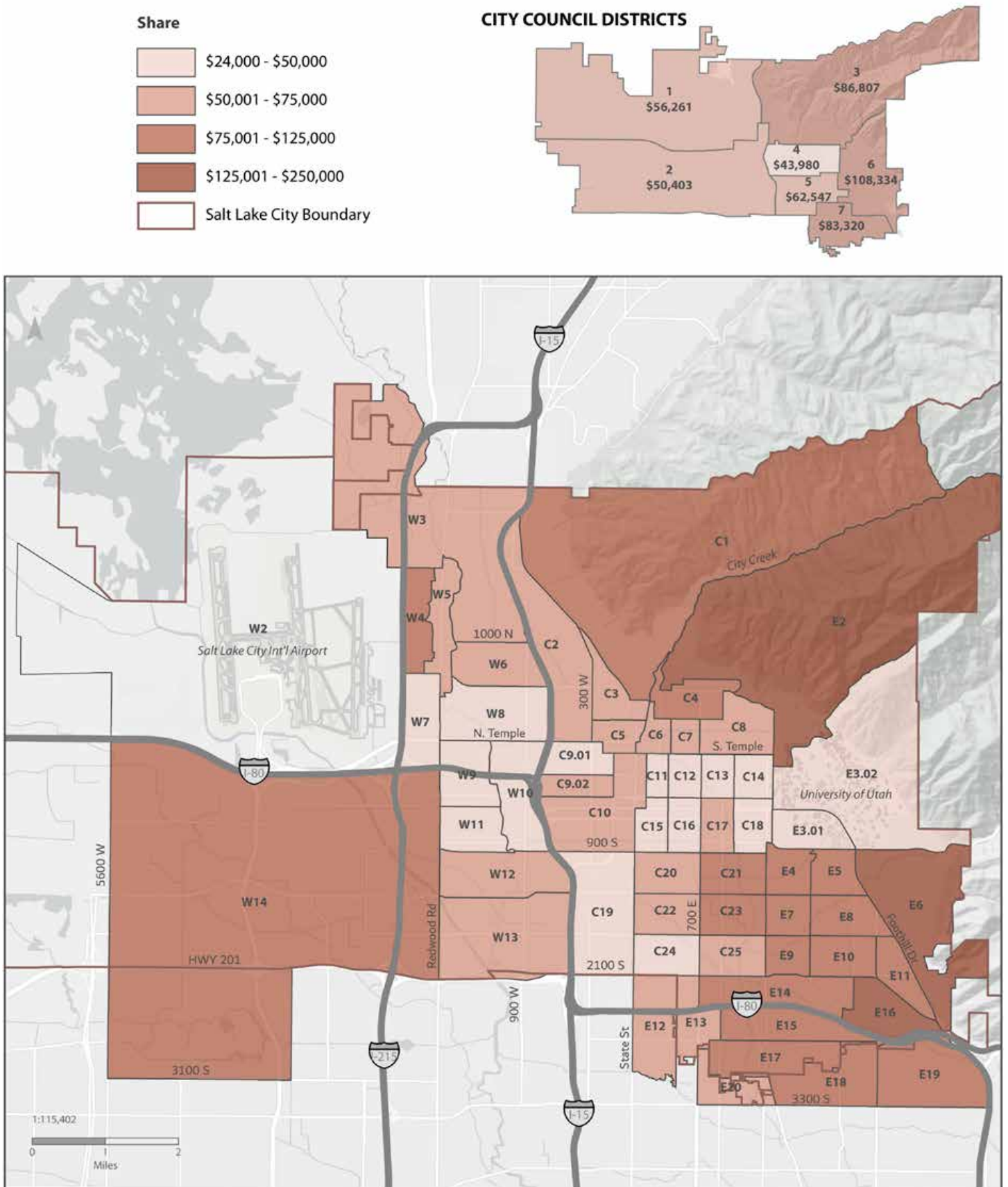

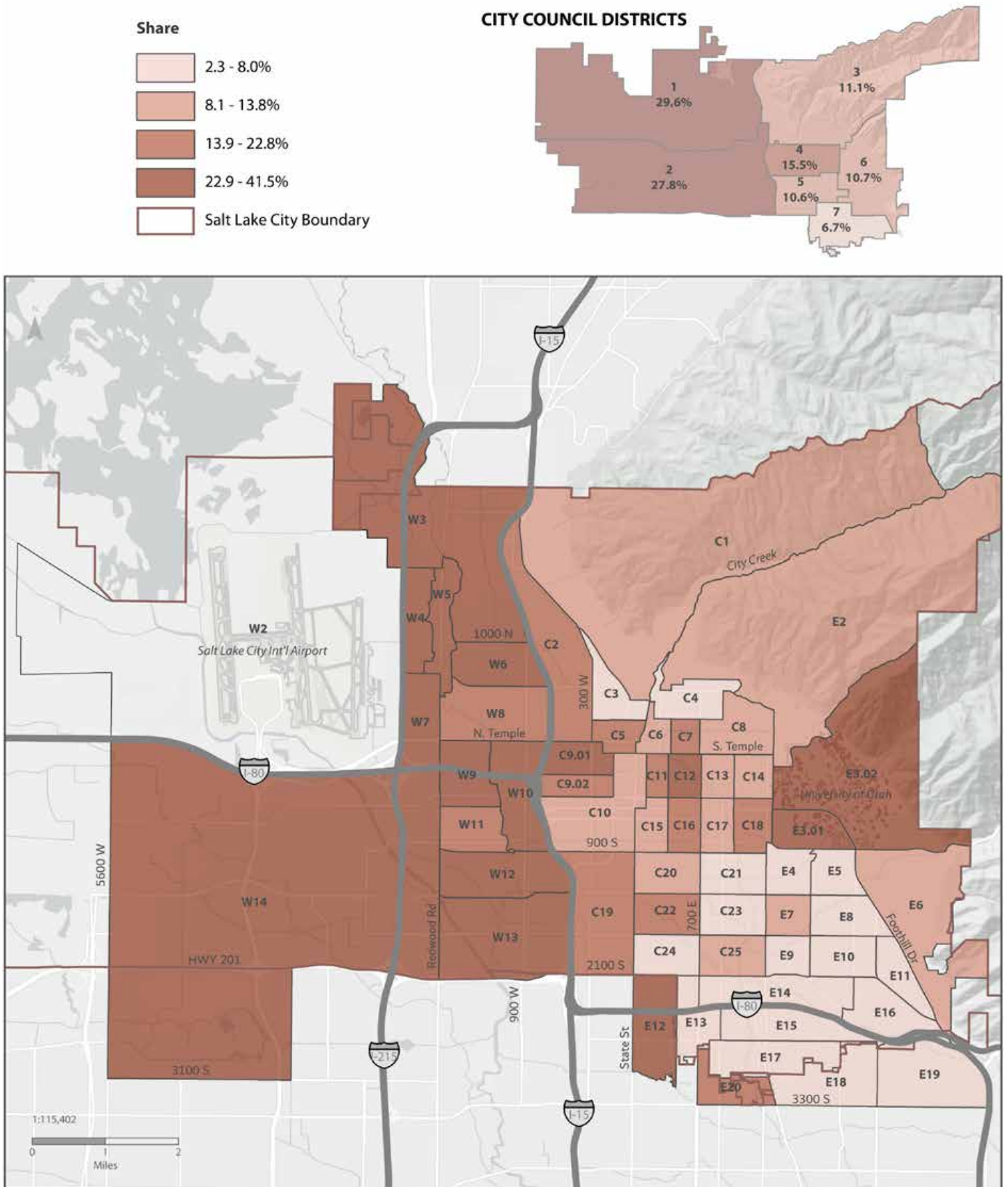

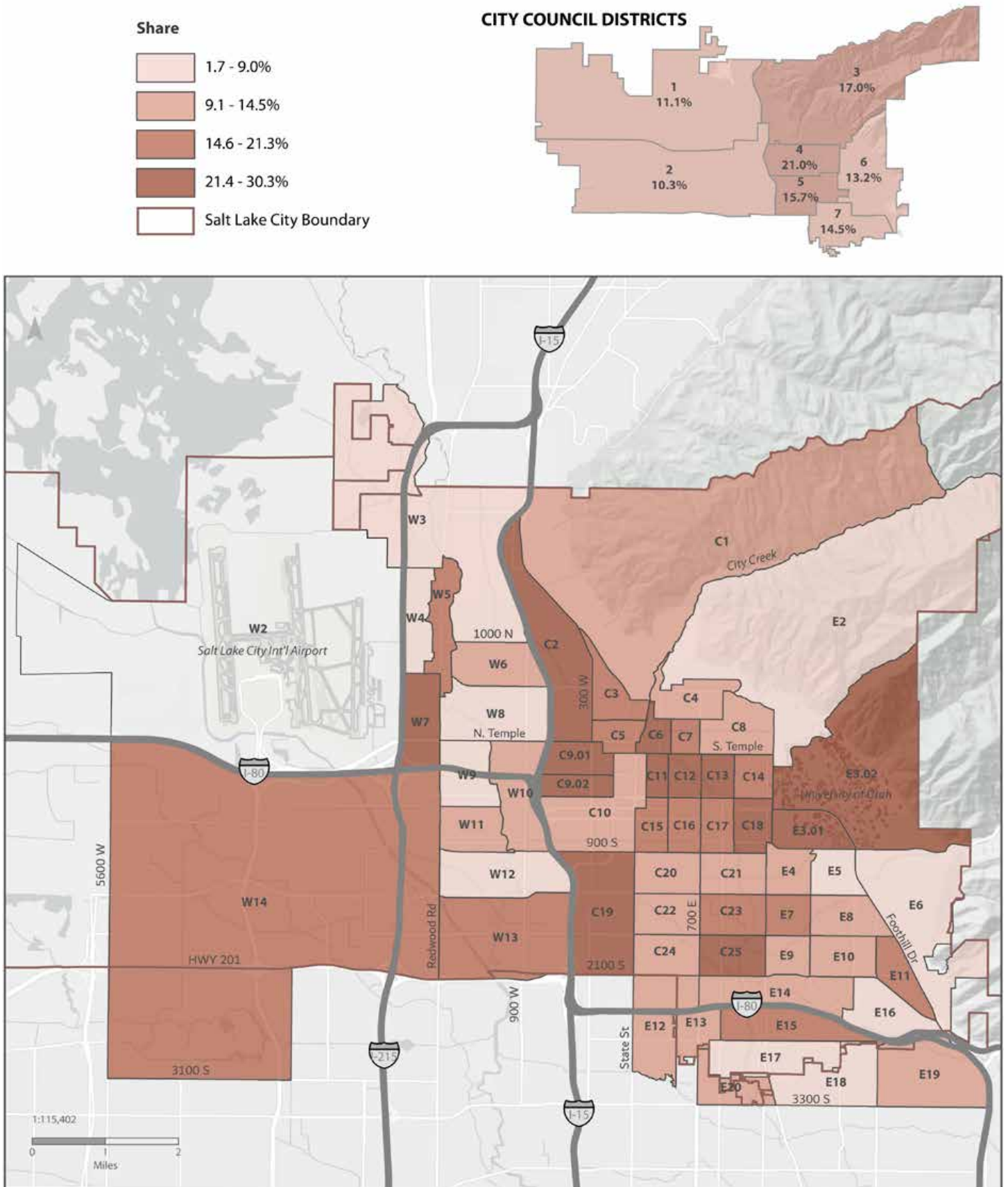

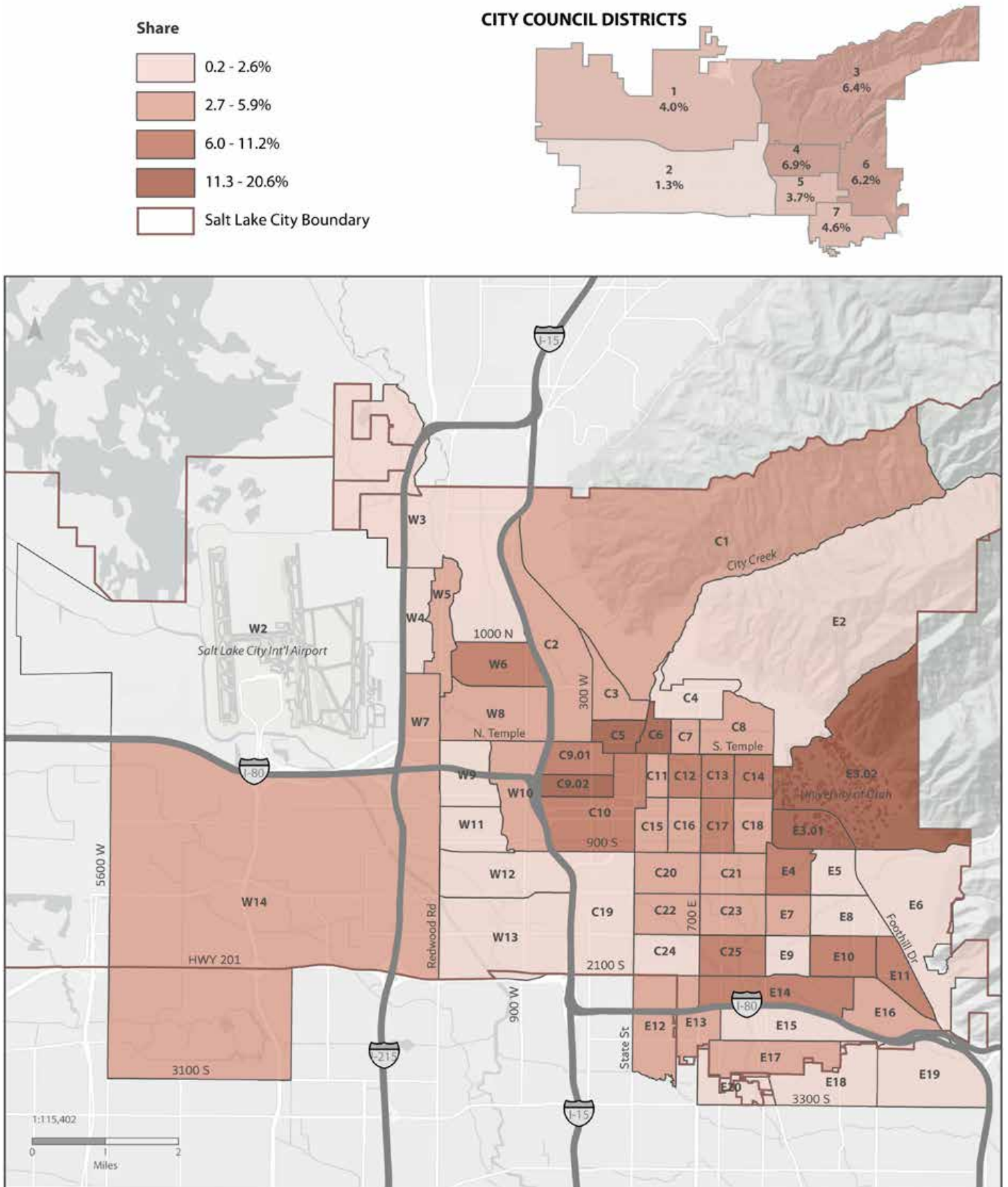

Redistricting (Public Law 94-171) Summary File

The redistricting data is the second statistical release of the 2020 census suite of products. The redistricting data provides selected age, race, ethnicity, group quarters, and housing unit data for counties, cities, census tracts, and other areas.⁴

The primary purpose of the redistricting data is to inform governments in their decadal assessment of electoral boundaries. The data also provides the first findings for the smallest Census geographies, cities, towns, and counties from the 2020 census.

The decennial census is considered a total count of the population. Therefore, no margins of error or coefficients of variation are available for this data.

American Community Survey

The American Community Survey (ACS) is an ongoing survey conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau that provides information on communities' social and economic characteristics. The ACS began in 2008 and replaced the Census Long Form in 2010. ACS data are available annually for populations over 65,000 and every five years for all geographies with lower populations.

ACS data comes from a sample of the population, not a complete enumeration. Additionally, the Census Bureau collects data throughout the year rather than at a single point in time.⁵ These factors, combined with small sample sizes at the tract level, can create large margins of error and can make the data less reliable.

The ACS estimates of population and households provide the denominators for the shares given for all ACS data sections of this atlas. For example, the share of the family households in 2016-2020 in a census tract is derived from the estimated 2016-2020 total households. The following pages provide the denominators as a reference point. The maps display the total population and household estimates for this period.

COVID-19 impacted data collection for the ACS in 2020. Due to this, the Census Bureau introduced changes in methodology to mitigate nonresponse bias issues. Additionally, margins of error might be higher than in previous estimates. Data users should use caution when considering high margins of error (C.V.s) and when comparing to previous estimates.⁶

ACS Data Analysis and Aggregation

We analyzed the 5-year 2014-2018 ACS Estimates dataset. Census tract and city-level data are available in each dataset. City council districts for Salt Lake City are not part of ACS geographies; we aggregated groups of census tracts to approximate ACS estimates, margins of error, and other statistical values for each district. See the Geography Notes section for a reference figure displaying the grouping of tracts for each city council district. Data for these approximated city council districts do not sum to city totals.⁷

Though census tract and city data come from the ACS, several data topics in this book required us to aggregate multiple estimates to produce desired data topics. For example, educational attainment categories aggregate multiple educational attainment levels (less than high school diploma, high school diploma or equivalent, some college, etc.). We also calculated approximated margins of error and other statistical values for these new, aggregated estimates. We followed Census Bureau recommendations to aggregate estimates and statistical values across geographic areas and data subcategories.⁸

For this Data Book, a coefficient of variation (CV) is employed to help readers understand the "fitness for use" of the data. Although there are no set levels of fitness or reliability with the CV, smaller values are considered more reliable than higher values. The guidance provided by the Census Bureau also suggests:

"A general guideline when working with ACS estimates is that, while data are available at low geographic levels, in situations where the C.V.s for these estimates are high, the reliability of the estimates will be improved by aggregating such estimates to a higher geographic level."⁹

Further aggregation to reduce high C.V.s does not occur in this document. In 2005, the National Research Center proposed the following thresholds to analyze the reliability of ACS data:¹⁰

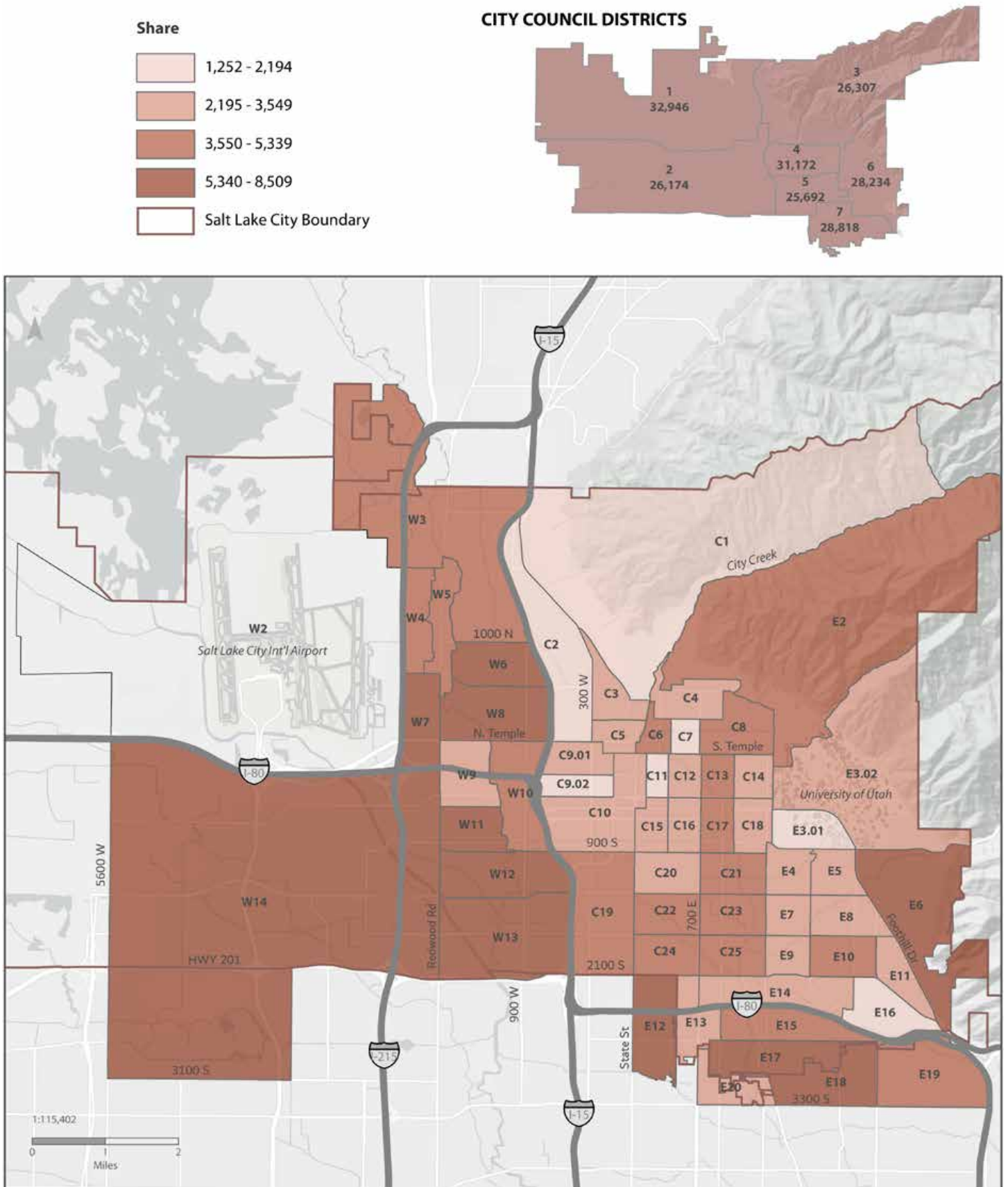
- High reliability – less than or equal to 12
- Medium reliability – 13 to 40
- Low reliability – over 40

Data Comments and Exceptions

Median household income estimates for city council districts are rough approximations based on the tract data.

Geography Notes

For most of the data subjects in this book, a census tract level of geography provides a community-level look at Salt Lake City.¹¹ The 2016-2020 American Community Survey 5-Year estimates correspond to the 2020 census tract geographies.

Two tracts, C9 (1025) and E3 (1014), were split between 2010 and 2020. This data book maintains consistency with the tract coding in previous data books and Census Bureau geography conventions. The primary tract code remains the same, with additional digits appended to the primary tract code. The updated tract codes are below:

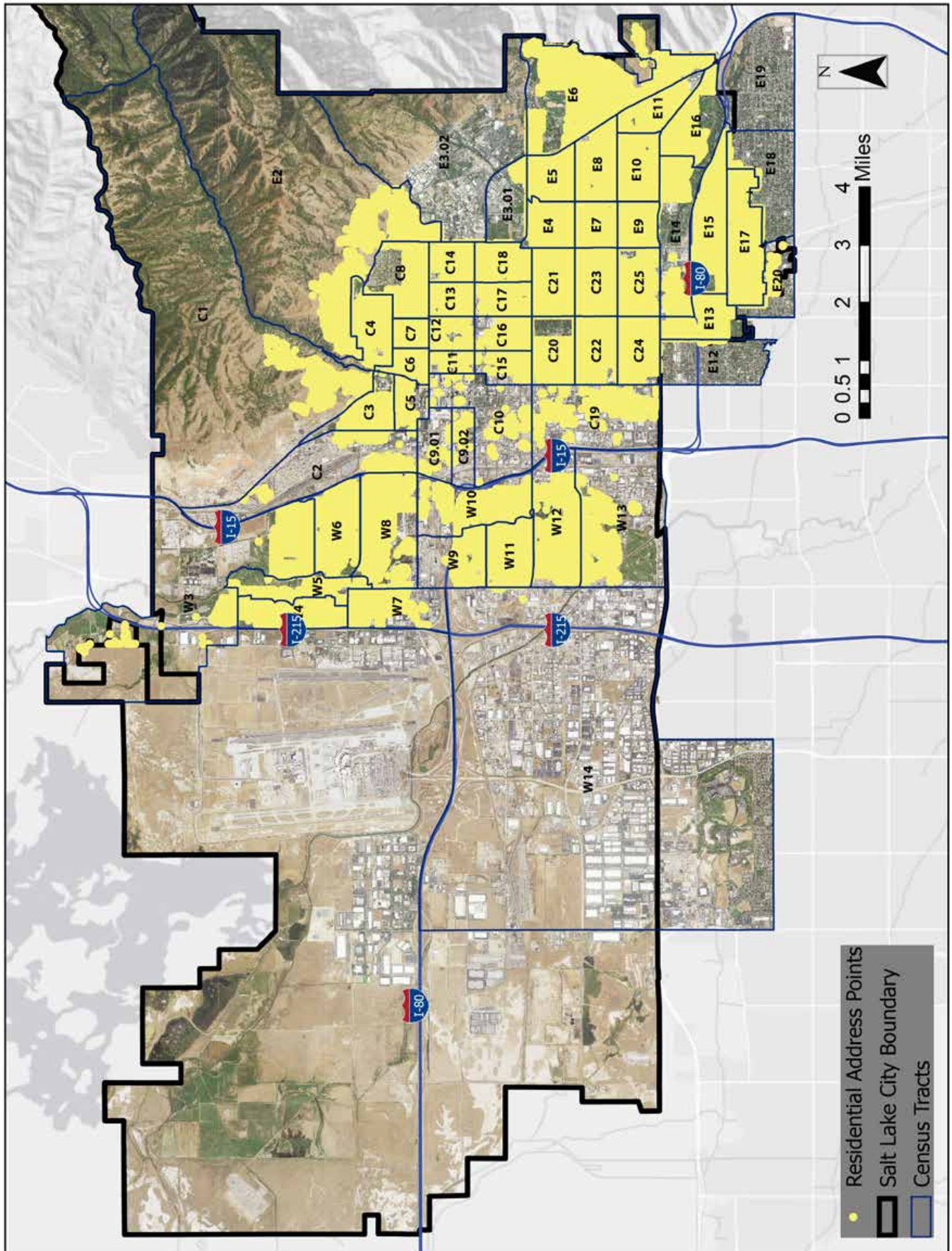
The Gardner Institute created the census tract codes shown in maps and tables as an abbreviated method of referring to tracts (W1, C1, E1, etc.). The letters W, C, and E in tract codes roughly correspond to the west, central, and east areas of Salt Lake City. The Reference Figures at the end of the book show

additional geographic reference information with the tract boundaries, such as streets, city council boundaries, and where people live within the tracts. Notably, the area of tract W14 is primarily within Salt Lake City, yet most of the population lives in West Valley City.

Place (city/town) boundaries are legal, while census tracts are statistical boundaries. While tract boundaries align with counties, the city-level and tracts may not align. A small number of the tracts included in this book are only partially located inside the Salt Lake City boundary, noted in tables with a symbol (†). The entire geographic area of these tracts may include residents of other cities. The maps and tables in this book present data corresponding to the entire tract area. Maps do not include tracts E1 and W1 due to the large geographic size of the tracts and their minimal numbers of Salt Lake City residents.¹² City boundaries are updated annually through the Census Bureau's Boundary and Annexation Survey (BAS) and are available in annual vintages. City level ACS 2016-2020 data match the 2020 city boundary.

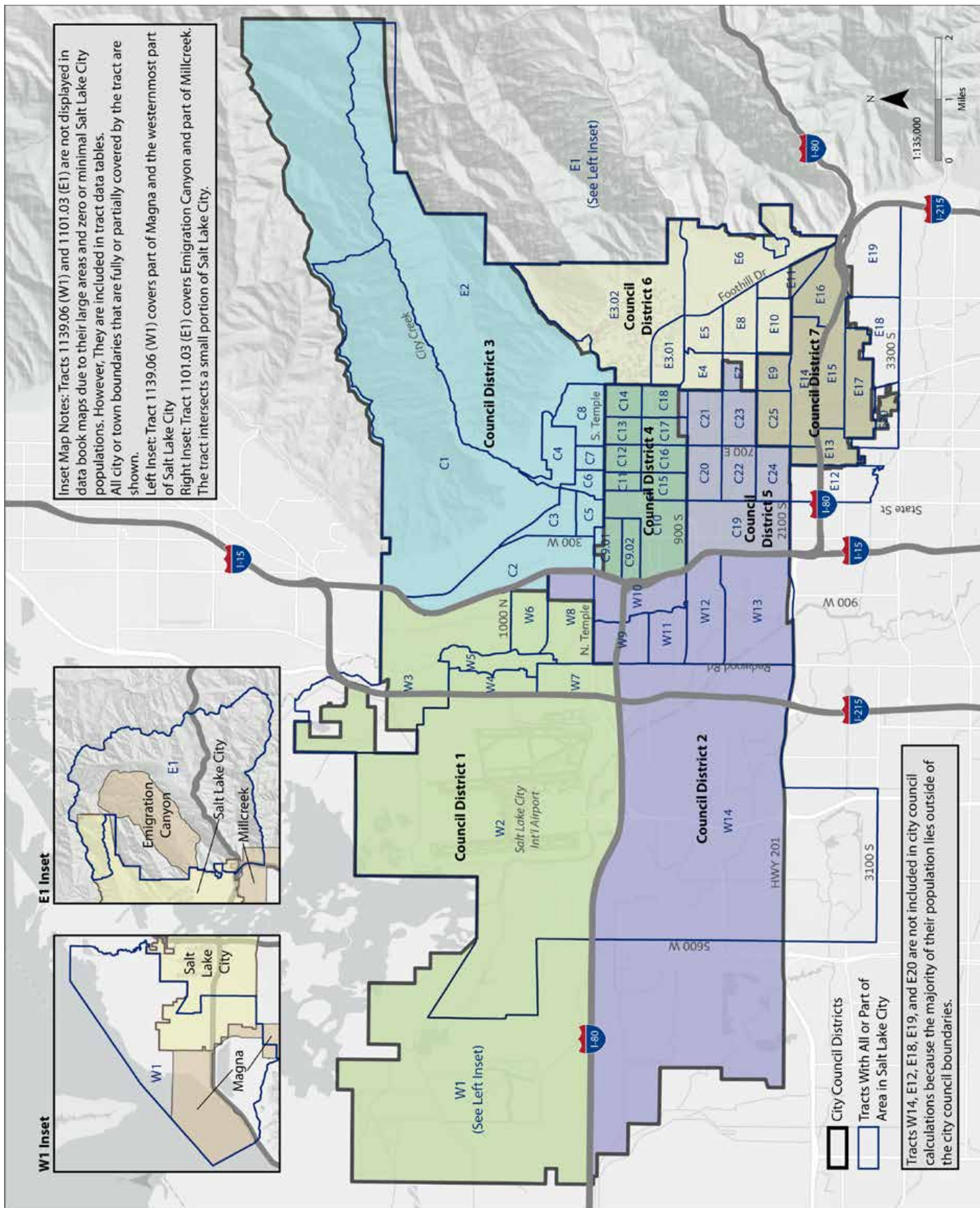

Reference Figure R3: Residential Addresses in Salt Lake City



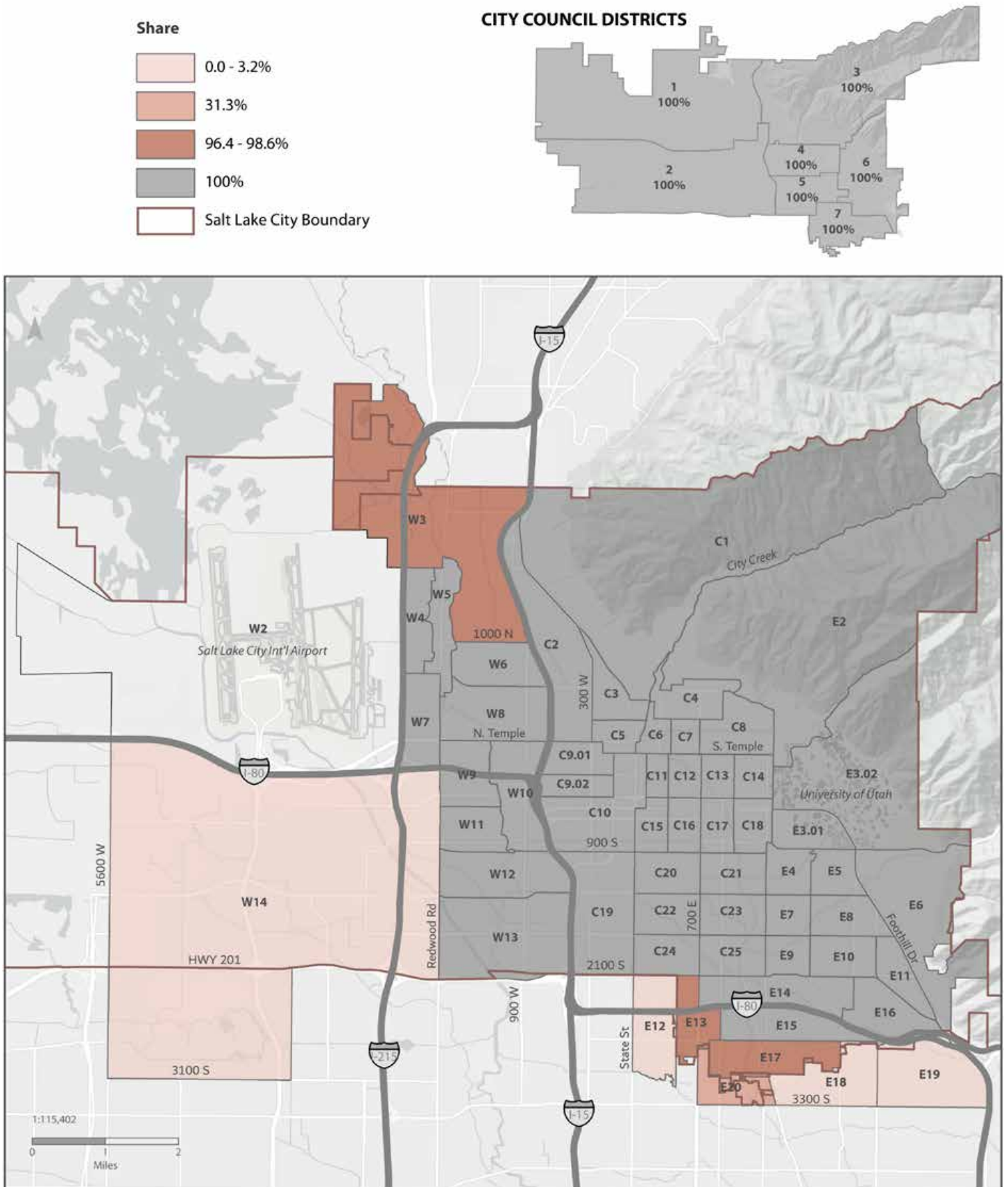
